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#### STEM PROGRAM AT THE LIBRARIES

The STEM committee was very busy in August with two library events in the same month. On Saturday, August 6, the Branch presented *Wobbly Robots* at the Wheaton Public Library. There was a single grade level program at the Wheaton Public Library due to insufficient youth participation in the grades 6-9 group. We had 23 excited children who were in grades 3-5. We discussed what makes up a robot from simple to complex and where they are used. The kids were intrigued by the bomb disposal robot but parents and AAUW volunteers enjoyed a video of a surgical robot peeling a grape. The room was filled with busy children assembling a robot from a plastic cup, vibrating motor and three colored markers. Of course, not every robot was a success but our AAUW assistants went to work helping the kids solve the problem. Branch members assisting the event were Karen Bondy, Nancy Daly, Laura Desmarais and Carolyn Oesterle.

Our August 27, we presented *Squishy Circuits* at the Glen Ellyn Public Library. We had 14 enthusiastic children in the morning session who were in grades 2-5. The workshop introduced students to understanding how a circuit works using conducting and insulting dough, an LED bulb and a battery. Kids were asked to build serial and parallel circuits, and of course, a sushi circuit [Yep! Ed.]. Our afternoon session had 6 eager students in grades 6-8. These participants quickly understood the concepts and went on to build very creative circuits such as the *Snowman Circuit* and the *Multiple Armed Circuit* with several batteries and LED bulbs. Branch members who volunteered for this event were Laura Desmarais, Rosemary Hahn, Debbie Ness, Donna Jean Simon and Patricia Spence.

We could use your help as a volunteer for this outreach program. No science experience needed-just enthusiasm. There is no better fulfillment than seeing a child's eyes light up when they understand a new concept. Please join us at our next library events.

State	SB 2221 passed, which increases oversight of DNA testing of sexual assault kits in police custody and sets up a reporting mechanism for local police departments. The bill also establishes a way to better track those who have committed multiple assaults. Two AAUW resolutions passed: HR 1021 (Equal Pay Day in Illinois) and SJRCA24 (support of Equal Rights Amendment).  HB 5538, which strengthens the law determining the domestic violence training officers receive, is pending Rauner's signature. He may veto SB730, a bill that increases child care for those receiving Temporary Assistance for Needy Families.	
National	Kate Nielson, AAUW State Policy Analyst, recently created a spreadsheet showing pay equity laws in each state, available at <a href="http://www.aauw.org/resource/state-equal-pay-laws/">http://www.aauw.org/resource/state-equal-pay-laws/</a> . See also AAUW's voter guides showing how politicians have voted on issues important to AAUW at <a href="https://www.aauwaction.org/voter-education/voter-guides/">https://www.aauwaction.org/voter-education/voter-guides/</a> . From her national overview, Kate has observed progress for equal pay and paid leave initiatives. One unfavorable trend has emerged: the use of preemption laws to discourage local wage increase efforts, e.g., a state declaring that a city cannot have a higher minimum wage than the state.

The Legal Advocacy fund (LAF) provides financial and organizational support for a select number of sex discrimination cases in the workplace and academia that have the potential to provide significant protection for all women.

After the closing of the Supreme Court, Molly Lam at AAUW holds a phone call for anyone interested in the results of pertinent cases. Her call is still available on the LAF website. She covered several cases and I have written below about one of them.

One case that was decided in the recent Supreme Court session is *Fisher v University of Texas* in which Abigail Fisher was denied admission to the Austin campus. The university's practice was to admit all students in the upper 10% of their high school class. For the remainder of the applicants, a policy which includes race as only one of the factors for admission was applied. The plaintiff was not among those admitted. She alleged that she was discriminated against because of her white race. This case was decided in favor of the university, affirming the opinion that race is an important factor in education.
