Kudos to Fran Kravitz for her Saturday at the Glen Ellyn Library, teaching the science of density. Check *Twigs* for further STEM dates and intrigues with Fran. On October 22, several of our Branch members attended the Illinois State Conference at Oakton Community College in Des Plains. These are just some of the recent Branch activities that make us a big part of AAUW.

It is particularly special that our Branch has been newly-recognized by National for our years of participation and service. Here are some words of praise and thanks to us from Patricia Fae Ho, AAUW President, recognizing Wheaton-Glen Ellyn for some achievements we have helped to further over the past 60 years:

- ✓ We continue to grow with more than 170,000 members nation-wide.
- ✓ AAUW awarded \$3.7 million in fellowships and grants to 241 scholars, researchers and community-based programs this past year with monies we helped to raise.
- ✓ More than 3,211 middle school girls participated (as did our Fran Kravitz) in 18 one-day AAUW National Tech Savvy conferences and 21 week-long Tech Trek camps across the country.
- ✓ Solving the Equation: The Variables for Women's Success in Engineering and Computing was published in March 2015. This research report was live-stream launched, and featured in Forbes, Fortune, USA Today and The Washington Post.
- ✓ Along with AAUW's strategic advice, the US Deptment of Education released resources for Title IX coordinators for the first time in the civil rights law's 43-year history, providing critical information to those enforcing Title IX.
- ✓ Start Smart, Elect Her, student organizations and e-student affiliate numbers all continue to grow, along with AAUW college/university partner members.

We have much to be proud of. These accomplishments remind us of the passion that has helped us achieve such progress.

We meet November 4, at the home of Elaine Nissen to discuss *Mean Spirit* by Linda Hogan (Chickasaw). Our discussion leader is LaVonne Ruoff, with Jean Lindsey and Ruth Schumacher serving as cohostesses.

Set in the 1920s, the novel is a fictional account of the Oklahoma Osage Oil Murders. After Grace Blanket is murdered in 1922, her Osage family and friends attempt to protect her daughter and get federal officials to investigate. It is widely taught in Native American literature courses.

<u>STEM</u>

It must be STEM at the Glen Ellyn Public Library if it is October. On Saturday, October 15, the Branch presented the topic of density to 23 energized children in grades 2-5 in the morning and 8 inquisitive kids in grades 6-8 in the afternoon. We discussed the definition of density and demonstrated the concept using balls of similar size but different weights, an apple and a peeled orange vs an unpeeled orange in a tank of water. Next, students built density towers out of various concentrations of sugar solutions using their skills not to mix the layers as they added one layer on top of another. Our last activity studied the effect of pressure on density using a Cartesian Diver in a 2 liter bottle filled with water. René Descartes, philosopher and mathematician, developed this method to demonstrate this principle in the 17th century. Branch members who participated in this event were: Stacy Adamek, Laura Desmarais, Jean Lindsey, Barbara Lukas, Elaine Nissen, Donna Jean Simon, Jean Tufano and Stef Zvirin.

We could use your help as a volunteer for this outreach program. No science experience needed-just enthusiasm. There is no better fulfillment than seeing a child's eyes light up when they understand a new concept. Please join us at our next library events.

The AAUW Action Fund Congressional Voting Record (CVR) provides information about elected federal legislators through the votes they cast on issues that are critical to the Action Fund's mission. The CVR provides information about senators' and representatives' co-sponsorship and votes. Each legislator is scored based on their record on AAUW priorities. These priorities include equal pay, education, campus sexual assault, campaign finance, human trafficking, and reproductive rights. The AAUW CVR is distributed to every member of Congress. Hard copies of the CVR were distributed at the last Wheaton-Glen Ellyn Branch meeting. State:

Prostitution is very much a part of today's underground sex trafficking economy. AAUW was at the lobbying forefront of Illinois efforts to eliminate sex trafficking by supporting legislation that makes the public aware of its existence and providing a call hotline. Effective January 1, 2016, the law is entitled "Human Trafficking Resource Center Notice Act." The new law requires businesses to prominently display signs that inform about trafficking and how to get help. Among these posting locations are emergency rooms, liquor stores, adult entertainment businesses, truck stops, rest stops and airports. See sample poster at:


