A Leaf from the President

In October, Rosemary Hahn led a successful Eleanor Roosevelt Walk to support equal rights for women and girls. The name honors the woman who championed equal rights for the working women of her time. She lives on in AAUW's national support for women's equality and in the 20 Wheaton-Glen Ellyn Branch members who marched in protests following our national election and who challenged legislative representatives. Locally, Patricia Spence, Jean Lindsey, and Sandra Alexander were some of the essential organizers.

Peggy Connolly and Susie Gullickson arranged an array of inspirational programs this year. We are proud of the financial seed money given by AAUW to Marie Curie and portrayed by Maria Bakalis at Fall Showcase. This informative narrative was followed by Jamie R Daling's timely description of the work being done by World Relief DuPage/Aurora Volunteer Services... important information when we think of the shallow resources and lack of safety for refugees living in our midst. November also spotlighted the unconventional career paths for women at a Glen Ellyn brothel, as researched by Historical Society member Dan Anderson. And our own Glennette Turner presented a thorough description of the Underground Railroad in February.

Our Winter Banquet featured a sparkling presentation by Skyler Schrempp, a Wheaton-Glen Ellyn Kay Storm/Marjorie Robinson Project Grant recipient at The Viola Project for Chicago's underserved middle and high school girls. Shakespeare is the lens used to focus on social justice issues. Skyler's articulation of this program was inspirational. We appreciate the efforts of Marilyn Wiedemann and Susan Levy-Creed who contacted Skyler.

Winter also saw the settlement of a 2012 court case against the University of Tennessee by 3 women who were to lose their jobs with the merger of the men's and women's athletic departments. The women won this sex discrimination case with the help and support of AAUW's Legal Advocacy Fund, which our Branch supports. Thanks to Gail Davis, who keeps us informed.

A truly wonderful event was a special presentation of Sterling Library's botanical prints by Rita Hassert at Morton Arboretum. It was a unique opportunity to view some of their beautiful collection first hand and relevant to many of the non-fiction books on environment, conservation and endangered species that we have read together in our book groups.

Soon we'll be conserving trees by recycling good books. We salute Laura Desmarais, Jean Tufano, and Steph Zvirin, our hard working Book Sale captains. We're ready to sail and Sale. We're planning a triumphal entry into summer's harbor. Come help and experience the rewards of working together... and enjoy the Spring Banquet celebration.

Four hundred years ago, a group of Dutch merchants and independent trading companies, impatient with the Portuguese monopoly of the spice trade and growing British sea power, founded the Dutch East India Company. The Dutch East India Company was granted a government charter, guaranteeing the right to the colonize any territory it desired and enslave the indigenous people to achieve market and political goals. In 1652 a "refreshment station" was established at the Cape of Good Hope to service ships and crews passing to the spice lands. South African cuisine reflects the mix of indigenous influences, trade, and colonization.

April General Meeting Presentation

Between 1973 and 2008, the central and eastern United States experienced an average of 21 earthquakes of magnitude three and larger annually. In the same area in 2014, there were 659 comparable earthquakes. The US Geological Survey concluded that human actions, particularly fracking, have contributed significantly to increased incidents of earthquakes.

Jessica Fujan, the Midwest Region Director at Food & Water Watch, will update us on the science, policy, and future of fracking. In her role with Food & Water Watch, Jessica works to fight back fracking and frac sand mining, to halt factory farm waste, and has stopped the privatization of public water utilities. She also works for more transparency in food labels.

Fracking and Earthquakes

Jessica was formerly a community organizer for affordable housing in Chicago. Following her graduation from Beloit College in 2008, Jessica also worked for Heifer International, Brigadas Internacionales de Paz in Guatemala, and interned for the World Food Program in Nepal. Washington, D.C. Advocacy: The Trump budget will contain massive cuts to non-defense discretionary (NDD) spending, which includes programs related to labor, health, and education. Rep. Tom Cole (R-OK) has commented: "There's no part of this budget that can escape unscathed if we have \$18 to \$20 billion in reductions." At the same time, the president's budget will call for additional defense spending. In response, AAUW signed a letter with 2,000 organizations to urge Congress and the president to work together to protect NDD programs from further cuts.

Springfield, Advocacy: HB40 (preserves pro-choice legal status in Illinois regardless of Supreme Court decisions) continues to work its way through the Illinois legislature. As *Twigs* goes to press, AAUW-II. lobbyist Jenni Perdue believes that the votes to support HB40 exist in the Senate, but it must first clear the House.

Celebrate Equal Pay Day, April 4: Raise your glass! A major technology corporation, Intel, announced that it has achieved **100 percent equal pay** for women and underrepresented minorities, according to its 2016 diversity and inclusion report. Reality check: A Harvard researcher found that requests for flexible workplace scheduling are more likely to be granted to men than women. http://fortune.com/2017/02/21/flexible-schedule-women-career/

DuPage County: The Better Government Association will offer BGA Watchdog Training DuPage County on April 24, 7:00 pm until 9:00 pm at DuPage Universalist Unitarian Church. BGA teaches you how to keep an eye on government and find out what's happening in your community. In this training, experts will help you understand government, the Open Meetings Act and the Freedom of Information Act. It is free and open to the public. 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
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



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What is AAUW?
