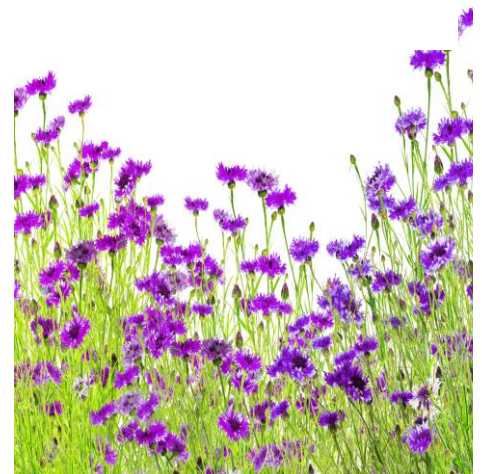

In April, our Branch presented a workshop on 'Squishy Circuits' at the Wheaton Public Library on Saturday, April 15. We had 17 energized children who were in grades 2-6. Two of the participants were the granddaughters of Nancy Daly who were in town visiting her. The workshop introduced students to how a circuit works using conducting and insulating dough, a LED bulb and a battery. They were asked to build serial and parallel circuits and, of course, a sushi circuit. The final activity had them design their own circuit. Branch members assisting in this event were Nancy Daly, Jean Lindsey, Elaine Nissen, Carolyn Oesterle and Donna Jean Simon.

Other events that our Branch participated in March were STEAM Feast at the Glen Ellyn Public Library and Tech Savvy. Our table at STEAM Feast was quite successful as a number of children of all ages stopped by to learn about density using Cartesian Divers, magnetism by balancing metal washers on a glass, diffraction of light with hand-built kaleidoscopes and properties of gravity by playing Suspend. Attendees also picked up AAUW membership brochures from the table.

Tech Savvy, held at Triton College in River Forest, continues to be a success even with the late start to registration. This is a day-long program for middle school girls. The program offers girls the opportunity to explore areas of science, technology, engineering and math workshops in the morning followed by an afternoon of Savvy Skills workshops. Total attendance for this program was 148 girls.

Both the Wheaton and Glen Ellyn Public libraries have asked for a series of new workshops before they will schedule future events. Possible future experiments will be on developing solar cells using blackberry juice and a microscope slide, wind turbines to demonstrate wind power, Newton's Cradle to investigate the laws of physics, nanotechnology to clean up oil spills and a motion powered electrical generator. Stay tuned for future workshops at the libraries and the beginning of our mother/daughter club.

Springfield, Advocacy: AAUW-IL needs you! Contact your state legislators about any or all of the almost 80 bills monitored by AAUW-IL Public Policy leadership. You can find out who your legislators are on the [Illinois State Board of Elections website](#). Office numbers and phone numbers can also be found on the [Illinois General Assembly website](#). The bills include several AAUW-IL that opposes, e.g., HB 2481/SB 50, which would legalize silencers in Illinois, making mass shooters even more dangerous to citizens and law enforcement.

Along with gun safety, the bills fall under the categories of People's/Labor Agenda, Budget, Homeless, Civil/LGBTQ/Voting Rights, Immigration, Environment, Police/Criminal Justice/Re-Entry, Health Care, Economic Issues, Education, and Animal Rights. The **Women's Agenda** category includes the following:

<u>HB40</u>	Would safeguard legal abortions. House Bill 40 repeals a dangerous 'trigger' provision in the Illinois Abortion Law. It confirms that abortion will remain legal in Illinois even if the US Supreme Court rolls back Roe v Wade.
<u>HB2771 / SB1296</u>	Securing paid sick time and paid Family Medical Leave for working families so that women can take care of themselves and their children.
<u>HB2462 / SB981</u>	Strengthening the Illinois Equal Pay Act to target systemic discrimination.
<u>HB3215</u>	Learn with Dignity: Requires a school district to make feminine hygiene products available, at no cost to students, in the bathrooms of school buildings.
<u>SJRCA4</u>	Ratifying the ERA in Illinois. The U.S. has 36 states who have taken this action, most recently Nevada in 3/2017. There is active legislation at the Federal level to enable 38 states to trigger full ratification of the ERA in Congress.
<u>HB 690</u>	Addresses gender discrimination affecting about 400,000 women in Illinois.

When you click on a bill's number in the link below you will learn its current status in the legislature or ask the office staffer you speak to about a bill's progress. The office staff works for the legislator and you. See the complete list of bills at <http://www.illinoiswomenmarchonspringfield.org/legislation/>.

Early April	Voter PINs were emailed to members and mailed with the Spring AAUW <i>Outlook</i> .
April 14 - June 15	Members vote online.
June 16	Election results announced at National Convention (June 14-17) and online. See http://www.aauw.org/resource/national-election/

Of special note: The *Spring Outlook* will contain the candidate slate, bylaws proposals, Public Policy Program proposals, and resolutions we will be voting on. A proposed national bylaws change would move the approval of the Biennial Public Policy Program (PPP) to the AAUW Board of Directors and away from the direct votes of individual members.

While the AAUW Governance Committee's rationale states that the PPP is the only 'program' that is voted on by the general membership, others feel the PPP is the very core of AAUW. All members should have a direct vote. The period to comment on or propose bylaws amendments, Public Policy Program changes, and resolutions has ended. The April to June voting period will allow more time for examination of proposed changes.
