
## Update from our Co-Presidents Lisa Cherry and Sue Herrmann

#### Legislative Update, Springfield

As *Twigs* goes to press the status report on seven of the bills that AAUW-IL has advocated for is as follows: **HB 2462** (job applicant cannot be asked about work history); **HB 2663** (early childhood programs receiving grants from SBOE cannot expel children); and **HB 3215** (requires schools to provide free hygiene products in school bathrooms) all passed and are awaiting signature (or veto) from Governor Rauner. **HB 40** (overturning Roe vs. Wade will not affect Illinois); **HB457** (Task Force on Women at Risk must be appointed 60 days after bill enactment); **HB 2771** (Healthy Workplace Act) are still in committee. **SJRCA4**, the Equal Rights Amendment, has enough potential votes in the Senate to pass it, but needs support from 10 more members of the House. Proponents will work to secure this support before the 2018 session convenes.

AAUW-IL chose not to engage in lobbying on the high profile bills **SB1** (school funding reform) and **SB1351** (student loan bill of rights).

#### Results of AAUW National Election Re: Public Policy Program

All Proposal Topics passed. Three of eight proposed bylaw changes <u>did not pass</u>: establishing an *Advocate* category of membership; eliminating the degree requirement for AAUW membership; changing a voting quorum from 5% to 3%.

The Supreme Court decided 62 cases during the October 2016 term. According to Ebonee, AAUW did not sign onto any amicus briefs for cases heard during this term. She recently held a phone call with members during which she discussed cases involving universal legal themes like, the 1<sup>st</sup> Amendment, jury service, and gender discrimination. She forwarded a case review sheet in an email to me. If you are interested in knowing more about these cases, I will forward the email to you. In addition, the audio of the phone call is or will be on the website soon and you will be able to listen to it.

## 2017 AAUW National Convention Highlights Co-President Lisa Cherry

Shortly after dinner on the opening night of our National Convention, I stepped out into the ballroom hallway and was delighted to see Cordy Galligan, our VP of Marketing, with Judy Woodruff, veteran journalist, anchor and managing editor of the *PBS News Hour*. I could not help thinking that it was very appropriate to be able to greet Ms. Woodruff, because I have dinner with her every weekday evening that I am home. She was our speaker that evening and presented a fascinating description of what it is like putting together a news program in a politically volatile environment and a constantly changing news cycle. The bar that evening was set high, but we were not to be disappointed. An exciting and inspiring time was ahead!

My Co-President, Sue Herrmann, our new program Co-Vice President, Donna Jean Simon and Pat Walton joined me in Washington DC to represent the Branch and there were an additional 52 attendees from Illinois. We enjoyed a packed schedule of informational plenary sessions, inspirational speakers, and workshops that have instilled in us new and creative ideas. Lobby Day on Capitol Hill took on special meaning due to the tragic shooting of a Congressman the prior day. We visited with a senior member of Senator Dick Durbin's staff, a staff member from Representative Peter Roskam's office and enjoyed our time with the very informative and enthusiastic Senator Tammy Duckworth. In each meeting we advocated for two issues:

- Increased funding for the Office of Civil Rights to continue vital work to ensure civil rights statutes, including Title IX and its current regulations and guidance.
- Support protecting and strengthening federal financial aid programs that are critical to the success of women in higher education and help curb the student loan debt burden that they experience.

Speaking of student loans, our research department introduced us to their newest publication: *Deeper in Debt, Women and Student Loans* which is now available on the National website.

The key takeaway from this important publication is that about two-thirds of the 1.3 trillion dollars of student loan debt in the United States is held by women! Women are paid less than men, so it is even more difficult for them to pay off these loans.

This is a year of transition for the leadership of our national organization. We had the opportunity to say farewell to Patricia Fae Ho and welcome Julia Brown, our newly elected Board Chair. Kimberly Churches, Chief Executive Officer, had been on the job about a week but effectively addressed us throughout the convention. I look forward to their leadership.

The convention banquet was held on the last evening of our time in DC. At that point our minds were swimming with information and great pride in our organization. I don't think any of us were prepared for the experience ahead. I know I wasn't. I did not know that Tererai Trent, Ph.D., a 2001-02 AAUW International Fellow, would bring me to tears with the story of her climb out of poverty in rural Zimbabwe. Her organization's mission in based on the belief that education is the pathway out of poverty. I have never heard a more effective motivational speaker and will always remember her refusal to accept what she called "the baton of poverty" passed down through generations. I also could not have known that our next speaker, Supreme Court Associate Justice Sonia Sotomayor, flanked by Secret Service agents, would refuse to stay on the ballroom stage. She chose, instead, to walk from one end of the ballroom to the other, stopping at each table to shake each hand offered or receive a hug. She said she wanted to meet the women of AAUW and as she worked her way around the room she continuously and thoughtfully answered questions posed by Kimberly Churches. I am so grateful to have a person of this caliber participating in the momentous decision making of our country's Supreme Court.

How was the convention? Unforgettable.


