Spotlight on AAUW 2017-2019 Action Priorities: Priorities 4, 5, 6 that support Public Policy regarding education are:

- Vigorous enforcement of Title IX and all other civil rights pertaining to education
- Increased support for and access to affordable higher education for women and disadvantaged populations
- Increased support for programs that break through barriers for women and girls in STEM fields

AAUW National Update- Pay Equity Setback: The Office of Management and Budget is <u>halting</u> the implementation of the revised Employer Information Report salary data collection. The EIR would enable the federal government to identify gender and racial pay gaps. This termination is a loss for workers who rely on data to address the gender pay gap in their workplaces and a loss for employers who are making every effort to preemptively correct pay imbalances internally without outside intervention.

AAUW-IL Legislative Update for 100th General Assembly: During the fall veto override session, Governor Rauner's vetoes of AAUW- supported **SB 1351** (Student Loan Bill of Rights) and **HB 2977** (Cursive Writing) were overturned. **HB 4108**, the attempt to repeal the AAUW supported and passed, **HB 40** (protection for reproductive rights and insurance), did not progress. Other AAUW bills of interest that did not pass were **SB 1657** (Gun Dealer Licensing); **HB 2462** (Pay Equity), veto overturned in House but not enough votes in Senate); **SJRCA4** (Equal Rights Amendment), picked up more sponsors but no further action was taken; **HB 3211** (allows SNAP Benefits at state universities), bill is considered dead; and **SB 1353** (increases funds for residents of community assistance centers), veto stands.



Legal Advocacy Fund

The Legal Advocacy fund (LAF) provides financial and organizational support for a select number of sex discrimination cases in the workplace and academia that have the potential to provide significant protection for all women.

Success in an AAUW-supported case, Burhans v. Yale! In 2012, Susan Burhans Landino filed suit against Yale alleging sex discrimination and unlawful retaliation under Title IX and other laws. Burhans had been working at Yale, since 1999, as a communications specialist, and served the university as a security education coordinator. She claims she was discriminated against by Yale, and eventually terminated after years of attempting to help survivors of sexual assault on campus and alert Yale to potential Title IX violations.

The funds to support these cases come directly from the generous contributions of AAUW members. In our Branch, each member contributes \$5 per year.

Educational Opportunities Fund (EOF)

December is a special time for the branch EOF. It is the time we get to hear from one of the recipients of our fellowships or grants. Maybe this is a good time to clarify what those constitute.

American Fellowships: Women pursuing full-time study to complete dissertations, conduct postdoctoral research full-time, or prepare research for publication for eight consecutive weeks. \$6000-\$30,000.

Career Development Grants: Women pursuing a certificate or degree to advance their careers, change careers, or reenter the workforce and whose bachelor's degree was received at least five years before the award period. \$2,000-\$12,000.

Selected Professions Fellowships: Women pursuing full-time study in a master's or professional degree program in which women are underrepresented, including STEM, law, business, and medicine. \$5,000-\$18,000.

Community Action Grants: Individuals, AAUW branches and states and nonprofit organizations to fund innovative programs or non-degree research projects that promote education and equity for girls. One year grant--\$2,000-\$7,000, two year grant--\$5,000-\$10,000.

Dare to Dream Needs Volunteers This Year College of DuPage, January 13, 2018

Dare to Dream is a mother-daughter conference for Latina middle school women. It was established to introduce the value of continued education to local Latina middle school girls and their mothers. It was the brainchild of the Elmhurst AAUW Branch. Elmhurst reached out to Wheaton-Glen Ellyn, Downers Grove and Lombard Branches for support. It has been incredibly successful. There were over 100 girls at the first conference in 2009 and included seven school districts. Currently it is held in the Belushi Performance Hall at the McAninch Arts Center at College of DuPage, and fills every seat with almost 800 girls, moms, teachers and volunteers. The conference itself is only one day in the lives of these girls—a powerful day with lingering effects.

This year Dare to Dream is scheduled during COD's winter break. It has relied on student volunteers since moving to the COD campus. Dare to Dream committee is reaching out to all Branches for volunteer support this year.
