A Leaf from the Co-Presidents

We don't usually begin talking about membership renewal until later in the spring, but we wanted to provide you with an update earlier this year. As many of you may know, the AAUW national board of directors voted last June to enact the first dues change in almost a decade. Effective March 16, 2018, national dues will increase from \$49.00 to \$59.00. There will no change to state dues (\$10.00) or Branch dues (\$19.00); \$56.00 of your national dues and all \$19.00 of Branch dues are tax deductible.

Annual national dues currently account for 13 percent of AAUW's annual budget. They help to sustain and grow AAUW's programs and work that advances equity for women and girls. A combination of dues, donations and corporate and foundation funding is critical to supporting AAUW's salary negotiation workshops, groundbreaking research, advocacy efforts, campus leadership programs, and so much more.

Speaking of AAUW research and salary negotiation workshops, we want to thank those of you who attended our Branch program on the gender pay gap and what AAUW is doing to close the gap and provided us with such positive feedback. Actually, we heard that you want to know what more we can be doing locally and we heard from members who want to participate as part of the solution. We (your Branch board of directors) can think of no better way to maintain and grow our membership than to continue to provide specific information on all that your AAUW national, state and branch organizations are doing to change the climate for women and girls. But we know you don't just want information. You want results. Our CEO, Kim Churches has said "we can't remain mired in an outdated dues structure while expecting new results from the organization we love."

With the goals of women's access to education, economic security and securing leadership positions, I believe it's an honor to be a member of AAUW. Sue and I hope that every member of our Branch will renew their membership and continue this extraordinary journey to equity in the company of such wonderful Branch members.

Lastly, don't forget to mark your March calendar for our Branch program and annual meeting to elect officers. Our own Ewa Bacon has graciously agreed to will be with us to discuss her new book and we need your vote to elect our new officers!

Dr. Ewa Bacon is a historian who was most fortunate to get access to a primary source, the oral history of her father about his experience in Auschwitz. As a newly minted Polish physician, he became a prisoner functionary because his skill set was useful. Auschwitz was a remarkably complicated organization. Ewa will discuss the labor camp, the role of German big business and the creation of a prisoners' hospital in an Auschwitz unit: Buna-Monowitz. It took a lot of ingenuity and guile to save lives in such a place.

Spotlight on AAUW 2017-2019 Action Priorities

To guarantee equality, individual rights, and social justice for a diverse society, is the third AAUW Action Priority, therefore, AAUW advocates:

- Vigorous enforcement of and full access to civil and constitutional rights, including affirmative action and expanding voting rights;
- Self-determination of one's reproductive health decisions;
- Increased access to quality, affordable health care and family planning services, including expansion of patients' rights.

Show Me the Money- Illinois Style

Several large companies in recent weeks announced new policies that will benefit women in the workplace. Starbucks will expand its paid sick and parental leave policies, while Amazon and Bank of America both announced they will no longer ask applicants about their salary history. AAUW hopes the three employers, with multiple Illinois locations, have set an example to be followed by other businesses.

State Senator, Chris Nybo (District 24) is co-sponsoring SB 2333 that would make it illegal for employers to ask prospective or current employees about their previous wage or salary history. (Please note: I asked AAUW-Illinois Public Policy Chair, Jo-An Takamoto Sanbonjian, why our state organization had not filed a Witness Slip in support of SB 2333. Jo-An replied concern exists that in its current form SB 2333 is an unacceptable rewrite of HB 2462). HB 2462 was last session's wage history bill that AAUW lobbied for but was ultimately defeated by Governor Rauner's veto and by a subsequent failure of efforts to overturn the veto (Senator Nybo is the State Senator for many of our Branch members).

The Department of Labor (DOL) has proposed a rule that would make it legal for employers to pocket their workers' tips, as long as they pay those workers at least the minimum wage. Because women are more likely to be tipped workers and to earn lower wages, this rule would disproportionately harm them. Illinois women will lose an estimated 21 to 42 million dollars annually. AAUW has responded critically to the DOL regarding this measure.
