# The Impact of STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, Math) Education Dr. Megan Bang

We return to our familiar first Wednesday evening schedule on Wednesday, November 7 at 7:00 pm, at the Glen Ellyn History Center where we will welcome Dr. Megan Bang, Senior Vice President of the Spencer Foundation, Northwestern University. Dr. Bang received her Ph.D. in Learning Sciences, College of Education, Northwestern University. She is formerly an associate professor of Educational Psychology and affiliated faculty in American Indian Studies, University of Washington.

Dr. Bang grew up in the Chicago American Indian community, so we are especially thrilled to welcome her during the first week of Native American Heritage Month. In addition, she is an articulate advocate for STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, Math). In a review of her presentation last year at the Suwyn Family Lecture Series in Education, Washington State University, she spoke on how STEAM education can bring about a just, sustainable, and thriving future for Indigenous communities.

The Spencer Foundation was established in 1962 by Lyle M. Spencer. The Foundation is intended to investigate ways in which education, broadly conceived, can be improved around the world. The Foundation is dedicated to the belief that research is necessary to the improvement in education and is committed to supporting high-quality investigation of education through its research programs and to strengthening and renewing the educational research community through its fellowship and training programs and related activities. The Spencer Foundation gives grants up to \$50,000.

#### Springfield Scorecard: AAUW-1 vs. Illinois State Governement-6

AAUW Public Policy recognizes that gun violence is a public health crisis. With that in mind, what has happened so far to seven gun control bills introduced in our current 100<sup>th</sup> Illinois Legislature?

**HB 1465** (raise the age to purchase an assault weapon to 21) and **HB 1467** (ban the sale of bump stocks in Illinois) did not advance beyond being referred to Rules Committee.

**HB 1468** (place a 72-hour waiting period on the sale of assault weapons) was subjected to a second gubernatorial amendatory veto. Neither legislative house responded. The bill is dead.

HB 1469 (limit the capacity of magazines to ten rounds) no longer appears on the legislative list of bills.

**HB 1664, Amendment #1** (create a Dangerous Person Hotline and toll free number to enable individuals to notify the Illinois State Police if they have reason to believe someone is a clear and present danger) did not advance beyond being referred to Rules Committee.

**HB 2354** (allow family members, acquaintances or law enforcement to petition the court to allow for authorities to temporarily remove the firearms and Firearms Owner Identification Card from an individual who poses an immediate and present danger of causing injury to one's self or another with a firearm) was passed and signed into law by Governor Rauner.

**SB 1657** (firearms dealers must obtain five year licenses from the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation). Governor Rauner vetoed.

#### Another loss? From Jenni Perdue, AAUW-IL Lobbyist:

Because Governor Rauner responded with an amendatory veto to **HB4163** (prohibit employers from asking prospective job candidates about wage and compensation history) our state organization urges us to contact our state legislators to override the veto. Veto override session begins, November 13.







