This is the time of year when we remember the old and anticipate the new. This year our Branch had much for which to be thankful.

We listened to interesting speakers – Representative Terra Costa Howard on what it is like to be a woman state legislator and Professor Pam Silas, who led us through her experiences as a native American woman who is trying to rebuild her community. We participated in a Branch strategic planning session, which will give us guidance for our next two years.

We hosted several fund raisers, including the first annual LunaFest, another successful Book Sale, and our annual walk to fund special projects, this year the Legal Advocacy Fund. Due to the success of our fundraisers, we doubled our contribution to our College of DuPage scholarship recipients and forged a closer relationship with representatives at College of DuPage to support those recipients. We sent over a \$1,000 to the Legal Advocacy Fund and contributed to the AAUW Most Needed Fund.

Most importantly, we benefited from the research, ideas, perspectives and fellowship of each other. We shared the holiday spirit at our Annual Winter Banquet and saw how our contributions support young women of talent.

However, as is true of life, there was also sadness and health and family difficulties. Hopefully, for those who experienced these, you found solace, support, and love from the rest of us.

There is also much to anticipate in the New Year. 2020 represents the centennial of the passage of the 19th Amendment giving women the right to vote. We plan to celebrate this event in a variety of ways – more to come on that. We will host three women from very different backgrounds who will share their knowledge, experience, and expertise with us at our spring programs. We will host our second annual **LunaFest** on April 25. We will have our 59th annual Book Sale the first week in May. In mid-June, Illinois will be one of the leaders of the AAUW Regional Conference in Moline, Illinois, which will host more than a dozen states. Kim Churches, Kendra Davis, and other AAUW representatives will attend along with three days of speakers, networking opportunities, and fun activities.

We wish you every blessing in the New Year and look forward to seeing each and every one of you at our Branch meetings.

Update Washington: 2020 will be a very active election year. While AAUW is non-partisan and does not support candidates, our national organization wants us to examine and engage federal and state candidates about their positions especially on the AAUW *BIG FIVE*:

- 1. Equal Pay for Equal Work
- 2. Implementing Paid Leave (#1 and #2 also priorities for AAUW-IL)
- 3. Reducing Student Debt
- 4. Strengthening Social Security
- 5. Investing in Education-especially STEM Education Ensuring that Women and Girls are Equally Represented

Update Springfield: When the Illinois Legislature starts up in January, AAUW- IL Public Policy sources recommend referring to *Capitolfax.com* to keep up with the activity of our elected officials, especially in regard to *Fix the FOID*, the movement to pass bills that bring gun sense to gun ownership. The preamble to the list of 2019-21 Action Priorities states: *AAUW recognizes that gun violence is a public health crisis*.



My assumption is that members might see things two or three times, but it is usually important that they see them.
