FOCUS Women in Leadership STEM Program is designed to provide a peer network and leadership-training experience for emerging women leaders in STEM fields in the region. Operated through an inquiry methodology, participants spend each of four structured seminar days learning from leadership-development experts in emotional intelligence, diversity and inclusion, communication and negotiation. Participants also experience three field days, joining together at various locations in the region to meet with leaders.
