Dr. Silvia Alvarez-Claire uses long-term monitoring, manipulative experiments, and conservation-driven research to understand how environmental changes such as changes in soil nutrients and climatic conditions affect plant communities, mainly in tropical biodiversity hotspots. At the Morton Arboretum, she serves as the academic mentor for the Center for Tree Science, where she is a Co-Principal Investigator in their Research Experience for Undergraduates (REU) program.

She is also the co-leader of the Chicago Pod of 500 Women Scientists, a non-profit group that supports women in science and is dedicated to making science open, inclusive, and accessible.

Her presentation will focus on career choices in STEM and how she has incorporated STEM throughout her career as a biologist. Please join us at the Glen Ellyn History Center as we learn how STEM impacts us all.

Update: Springfield By the time this issue of Twigs is distributed, the Illinois State Legislature should be past its February 14 deadline to introduce new bills and in the process of deciding which bills move forward. Branch Public Policy Committee Chairs look forward to making available to members the AAUW-Illinois list of bills that our organization is supporting, opposing or just *watching*. Repeal of the Parental Notification Act, a comprehensive re-write of the Illinois sex education law and women's equity legislation are the current 2020 Public Policy goals.

Update: Equal Rights Amendment The two resolutions pending in Congress to extend deadline for ERA passage are House Joint Resolution 79 and Senate Joint Resolution 6. If you go to *Congress.gov* and subscribe to *Get Alerts*, you can track the legislative activity related to the ERA.

As an organization, AAUW has a strong online presence with national, state and branch web pages, Facebook pages, and a national Twitter account. But did you know that some of our Branch members are bloggers?

What is a blog? The term *blog* is short for *weblog*, which refers to an online journal. People use blogs to record their opinions, stories, and other writings as well as photos and videos. Some blogs are private (no ads) and others are sponsored. The writer of a blog with sponsors gets paid per impression or per click. Paid per impression means that the blogger receives income from posting the ad on the blog and the viewer does not have to click on the ad in order for the blogger to receive an income.

Private blogs are typically those used by people to record and remember their lives. They share their thoughts with extended family and friends. There are also marketing blogs where business owners offer ideas that may engage their audience in the services or products they are selling.

We are aware of three blogging Branch members – details follow. If there are others out there, let us know and post a link to your blog on the Branch Facebook page. We'd love to hear from you!

Many of you know **Winifred Creamer**, retired NIU archaeologist. Since retirement, she and her husband have been traveling the world and Winifred shares her experiences through her travel blog.
