Fasten those seatbelts as we try to maneuver our way forward through our schedule of non-fiction books. Since we do not have access to the Glen Ellyn Library's excellent lending services for book clubs, our published book selections will be pushed into next year. Instead I have honed-in on one of our favorite authors, Erik Larson, and his new book *The Splendid and the Vile: A Saga of Churchill, Family, and Defiance during the Blitz*. There are a number of Branch members who saw Larson locally at a book talk and also got a copy of the book. It is readily available on Amazon as hard copy and Kindle. You might check if you could order it at The Book Store in Glen Ellyn.

This book is a nail-biter! We of course know how the story will end, but Larson shows us the tension, the decisions taken as the 1940 crisis takes place. We, the reader, forget we know the general outline of how it ends and, in this book, we live through the crisis and experience it day by day.

But how to meet? There are TWO options available to you:

**Message from Tracey Sherman-Falcon, AAUW-IL Public Policy Co-Director:** I asked Tracey how far the Illinois State Legislature activity advanced on the current 2020 AAUW-IL Public Policy goals: (1) Repeal of the Parental Notification Act; (2) A comprehensive re-write of the Illinois Sex Education Law, and (3) Women's Equity Legislation.

Her reply: *Nothing happened before session ended on March 5. Maybe those bills will come up during veto...IF we have veto (session). Jenni Perdue (AAUW Lobbyist) does not think any of them will take place during whatever truncated session we will end up having to pass a budget before June 30 this year. So, legislation is frozen/stuck right now. Hopefully our legislative priorities will be addressed in 2021. Hopefully we will have session next year . . .*

## AAUW National Has a New Website

On April 10, AAUW-National introduced its' new website. The team spent a year analyzing how the website had been used by members and visitors, researching best practices, and developing innovations that would enhance the site and provide easy access. The website is AA rated ADA compliant and is visually appealing and easier to navigate.

The previous website was 12 years old and had 15,000 pages (*yes, that is the correct number*) of content, much of which had not been viewed in a long time. The current website has 250 well organized pages which highlight AAUW as a thought leader in women's issues through its reports, and leadership on fellowships and scholarships. The focus is on story-telling and graphics that show rather than tell about key concepts. The use of optimization has also been enhanced. The intent is to be relevant, inclusive, and high impact.

Through *Explore the Issues*, the three pillars are described and users are directed to updated research and resources for engaging with the issues. There is a specific section on *Fellowships and Grants* for those who are looking for this resource. And there is a section on *Governance*, which provides branch resources and tool kits, programming ideas, and the history of AAUW.

Check out the new website at [AAUW.org](http://AAUW.org) and see what new information you can find in this first phase. The second phase will happen in the fall and will include templates for branch websites, branding ideas, and how to link branches to the national website and vice versa.
