From Glenbard West, Erma Obic:

In her own words, I will be attending College of DuPage as a first generation college student. My background impacts my daily life majorly. Both my parents came to the United States as refugees from war and have worked non-stop to provide me with the life I have today. My father has worked mainly in back-breaking construction while my mom worked night shifts at O'Hare. My parents have taught me to work hard and stay determined throughout life. I will be majoring in nursing because I have a passion for taking care of others. Currently I am in the process of obtaining my Certified Nursing Assistant certificate at the Technology Center of DuPage where I received an award for my academic achievements. I also have maintained honor roll throughout my entire four years of high school. I spend my mornings and afternoons at high school and my nights working in a hot kitchen at Olive Garden about five days a week. During my free time, I usually take the time to stay connected with my family and friends because the relationships I have with others is what I value the most in life. Sometimes the many responsibilities in my life can be straining. I look forward to being on a college campus in the Fall and fully investing my boundless energy into becoming a nurse and partaking in several courses College of DuPage has to offer me.

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STEM REIMAGINED Our Science Girls on the Go!

The STEM committee has reimagined how we will present science to the community. The Covid-19 pandemic has affected the Branch in many ways including our STEM workshops. There is little hope of holding workshops until 2021 due to the restrictions on venues, group size and finding volunteers willing to meet in person. Children, especially young girls, need and want to participate in STEM activities.

The STEM Committee has come up with a new and novel approach to solve this issue. The idea is based on Little Free Libraries which have been popping up in every community throughout the country. Little Free Libraries are small wooden, metal or composite boxes with a clear window on a post in the front yard of people's homes which contain books that anyone can take or donate a book. Lately, they have also been used for nonperishable food. In our case, we would use them for disposable science kits.

The project and the name we would use on these boxes is called *Science Girls on the Go*. Initially, we would start with two boxes, one in Glen Ellyn and the second in Wheaton. These two boxes would be placed on a Wheaton-Glen Ellyn AAUW member's front yard with their permission. Each box would be stocked with 10 science kits and restocked weekly. During the pandemic, the science kit topic would change every two weeks. Later in the year, the science kit topic would change every month. Each kit would be a Ziploc bag containing the necessary components to do one experiment along with instruction on how to do it and the principle behind the science. The initial topics of the kits are Cartesian Divers, Diffraction of Light, DNA from Strawberries, Squishy Circuits, and Density Tower. Each kit has been designed for youth safety and will have a statement on the bag that these projects should be done under adult supervision. The number of box locations will increase with the success of the first two boxes and then finally, we would ask other AAUW branches to join in the program. In addition, these boxes will also contain AAUW membership brochures, upcoming Branch events and other Branch related material.

We will continue to present our STEM workshops in 2021. Our *Science Girls on the Go* project will be in addition to our workshops and used as another method of reaching out to the community.

The STEM committee needs your help:

- 1. We are looking for two Branch members, one each in Wheaton and Glen Ellyn to give us permission to place these boxes in their front yards.
- 2. We are looking for individuals who can build these little boxes. The blueprint has been downloaded.
- **3.** We need help with advertising once we have the boxes and locations.
- **4.** We are always looking for new committee members to come up with other additional ideas for inexpensive science kits. Timing is important since we would like to have these two boxes complete and placed in someone's front yard by mid-June (before kids go back to school and become too busy).

Please contact Fran Kravitz if you are interested in helping with this project or have questions. We will not be meeting as a group in person but virtually either by computer or telephone.

She enrolled in the bridge classes my husband and I taught for the Wheaton Park District at the Mary Lubko Center (next to the band shelter). In fact, she took nine of them from 2014 to 2020. She was even in the last class on March 12 of this year before all park district classes were cancelled due to the Covid-19 pandemic. She was a great student of the game and took it seriously. She progressed quickly and enjoyed playing it outside of class with Jean Tufano and Stephanie Zvirin and others. I remember when one of her daughters was married in Italy in 2015.

Gail was the Branch Legal Advocacy Fund Chair from 2015 to 2018 and did a fine job of keeping us updated about the latest court cases.

Bridge players all have a bond which connect us together. I will miss Gail's beautiful smile, happy laugh, and her many kindnesses. 'May all your Three No Trump games make.' Rest in Peace, dear friend.

From Jean Lindsey: Too sad, she will be missed by so many...her daughters were so devoted to her, I can't imagine how sad they are, of course, Ken...45 years is such a success story. Her grandchildren here and in London...what a loss...I'm happy that she and Ken had some great travels in the past years...loved that they took trips with foreign companies, know that they thoroughly enjoyed Greece...Ken is probably numb. Our church group will miss her quiet but supportive input, her willingness to meet with needy clients...her nonjudgmental attitude. She and I volunteered at a West Chicago resale shop for awhile, and although her leg challenges restrained her mobility, Gail persisted. She was the catalyst for our volunteer sessions. I will miss her, and am at a loss...too young, too good, too kind to leave us.

From Steff Zvirin and Jean Tufano: We were shocked and saddened by the sudden death of our dear friend Gail Davis. Gail was a devoted member of our Branch, over the years, giving her time and energy on the board and as co-chair of the annual holiday banquet. With a background in education, she was a devoted reader, a regular at AM Lit discussions, and she gave of her time to help with the Book Sale. She had a wide circle of friends outside of AAUW, loved to play bridge and travel and worked diligently for her church. A loving wife, mother, and grandmother with a wry sense of humor and a generous spirit, she will be missed.

Remembering Elaine March 18, 1942-March 17, 2020

Elaine died one day before her 78th birthday of ovarian cancer surrounded by her family. Services for Elaine will be held in May or as soon as possible. Elaine remained treasurer even though she developed ovarian cancer, requiring multiple treatments and chemotherapies. She wanted to continue to contribute as long as possible. She was also a steadfast friend, always concerned with others. She hosted many AAUW meetings, get-togethers with her neighbors and a yearly sisters' weekend for her siblings.


Elaine was very accomplished especially considering she had little help. Her family was not wealthy and she had to work her way through college. She became a respected CPA running the financial divisions for several companies.


I last spent time with Elaine the Friday before she found out she should enter hospice. She did not dwell on her problems. She told a funny story about a care worker who came to her house the day before and in two hours, knocked out one of the lights over her kitchen table, broke the strings for a window shade, and knocked a closet door off the hinges. Elaine laughed and said how she enjoyed talking with the home helpers. Elaine always looked for the bright side of things and the goodness in others. I will miss her.

From Lisa Cherry: I was Membership Vice President for the Branch when I learned that Elaine had been an AAUW National member for years and wanted to join our Branch. She said she was especially interested in our book groups and other social events. Elaine was also a neighbor and we had served together as board members for our community association. I knew she was a CPA, so I responded to her as a typically aggressive Membership VP. I said 'that was fine, but she really needed to prepare to serve in the future as treasurer.' Without hesitation, she said 'okay.' That was Elaine. I do not remember a time when she declined to serve or help when needed. Even when going through periods of treatment, she did not want to give up on her duties. She said she would feel better soon and sure enough I would see her walking in the neighborhood, perhaps with a cane and later with a walker. I believe her positive attitude and sheer determination provided all of us with a lesson we will not forget and I am grateful.
