While we are talking about the national association, please note that the National AAUW Board of Directors voted an increase in individual dues by \$3.00 in 2021, and \$5.00 in both 2022 and 2023. While many of us initially frowned at any increase at this particular time, it is reassuring that the increases are small, about the same as a pumpkin spiced latte. As Julia Brown, Board Chair wrote in her announcement: Simply put, this measure is essential for AAUW to continue our mission to achieve gender equity and noted that the first year's increase is only 25-cents per month.
- 4. Finally, Giving Tuesday is just around the corner. This is the first Tuesday after Thanksgiving (and after Black Friday and Cyber Monday). Traditionally it's a time when we are reminded to open our wallets or checkbooks to the causes nearest and dearest to our hearts. Please consider including AAUW in your 2020 giving.

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


December Branch Meeting AAUW Issues of Importance Wednesday, December 2 7:00 pm via ZOOM

Here Come the Judges!
The Addition of Women to the Supreme Court
Wednesday, January 6
7:00 pm via ZOOM



Please join us for our January 6, 2021 Branch meeting. Linda Hirschman, author of Sisters in Law: How Sandra Day O'Connor and Ruth Bader Ginsburg Went to the Supreme Court and Changed the World will be our speaker. She reveals stories of how these two trailblazing women fought for recognition in a male-dominated profession; battles that would ultimately affect every American woman. These women who were from opposite political parties, practiced different religions, cultures, and were from different regions of the country, yet they became friends as they listened to controversial court cases and helped create change in America making women more equal under the law. Ms. Hirschman also shows how these two justices shaped the legal framework of modern feminism, setting precedent in cases dealing with employment discrimination, abortion, affirmative action, sexual harassment, and many other issues crucial to women's lives. The lives of men were changed as well.

You may want to read Sisters in Law: How Sandra Day O'Connor and Ruth Bader Ginsburg Went to the Supreme Court and Changed the World and familiarize yourself with the struggles these women faced and how they overcame them prior to our Branch meeting. Feel free to invite a relative, friend, neighbor, or co-worker to join us for what promises to be a very enlightening and informative evening.

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On August 31[,] Branch assets came to \$25,259 and as of October 30[,] assets had increased to \$29,666. The increase included annual late dues renewals and two successful Branch fundraising events: (1) sale of the Book Sale inventory and (2) October Fundraising Walk contributions.

On September 30⁻ the Branch sold the Book Sale inventory for \$2000 thanks to the efforts of Book Sale Chair, Ewa Bacon. This was a difficult decision but with the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic it was determined to be the best option available. The agreement negotiated with the buyer may result in additional revenue in the next few months and the Branch will save over \$1000 in storage locker rental fees. Ewa also received a refund of the \$350 deposit made for rental of the church hall.

In October the Fundraising Walk Chair, Carolyn Oesterle, received \$1710 in contributions from Branch members. As Carolyn reported last month this exceeded our budgeted expectations.

The most significant expenses during this time were related to the annual Membership Directory: printing came to \$232 and mailing was \$84.

In the early '70's, a group of young DuPage women who were interested in women's reproductive rights joined together to start a family planning clinic in Wheaton. I was privileged to be a part of the group and the experience changed my life. We were too naive to think that we could not succeed, and we, volunteers, provided quality health care for DuPage women for several years. Now, we are a group of older women. Representative Sean Casten took an interest in our story and his office produced this video. The production could not be more timely now that



women's control of their bodies is in danger of being taken away. This is our *HERstory*.

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SCIENCE GIRLS ON THE GO



On November 3, the STEM committee released the third *Science Girls on the Go* ©kit to the little science houses in Wheaton (1445 Brentwood Lane) and Glen Ellyn (373 Oak Street). *Science Girls on the Go* is a science enrichment program for K-12 girls in the community. This month, the kits demonstrate properties of density and buoyancy. In this kit, girls will be building a density tower out of common kitchen liquids. Each kit contains a specialized centrifuge tube for preparing the four-layer density tower.

Sadly, this experiment is a substitute for the one the STEM committee was working on for the holidays. As scientists, we know not everything works and some things need tweaking. The STEM committee has gone back to the drawing board to try to make this a successful and safe experiment by changing the parameters of the experiment. Fingers crossed that the next kit is a crystalline delight.

We have also been busy working on making the project name, *Science Girls on the Go* and the idea of the little science houses and kits, copyright safe. This program and materials now belong to the AAUW Wheaton-Glen Ellyn Branch, NFP. All rights are reserved and the use of the name of *Science Girls on the Go* or the program may not be used without written permission from the Branch.

We need your help in spreading the word about *Science Girls on the Go* and our two little science houses. Please tell your neighbors, friends, schoolteachers, and your extended families about this program. The kits are free, and anyone is welcome to take a kit no matter where they live.
