Past President Karen Bondy, (1989-1991) Kitty Johansson

This month Past President Kitty Johansson focused her letter on one member's contribution to an AAUW Branch program that epitomizes our values and program goals and illustrates the commitment members make to these efforts. Do you remember this program?

Still a vital and steady source of nutrients for the Branch, Karen Bondy is one of the main anchors who customized an existing life planning program for middle school girls attending Edison and Hadley Middle Schools in Wheaton and Glen Ellyn. Over several years, as Branch members tweaked and updated the program, it gained momentum and popularity, eventually including boys as well, before the Branch transitioned the running of the event over to teachers and parent volunteers as part of the curriculum. Many girls (and boys) were better able in a real way to envision choices for their future careers.

REALITY STORE began as a one-day event, issued a calculation list (eventually a debit card) for each girl to use to first choose a career, then rotate through a series of stations where advisors helped her formulate what her career would entail. Each student was issued an appropriate salary from which she constructed a budget encompassing the cost of renting or owning a house, utilities, owning a car or train fare, food, clothing, children including day care and basic medical care. The student would deduct these costs from the salary and decide whether she could accommodate the budget and live within the remainder if she made those choices, starting with the career. The Branch provided the counselors and the research and, in the end, the students learned whether their selected occupation would provide the financial resources needed for the lifestyle choices they may make. Financial planning, career choice, reasons for staying in school were all topics that were covered – and the students had fun!

Karen is still giving her time and talent to Branch projects and we are enriched by her knowledge and organizational abilities.

10 Easy Ways to be More LGBTQ Friendly and Why It Matters Presented by Katie Slivovsky

Come explore how to be a better ally for the LGBTQ+ community. We will look at research, work on new vocabulary, discuss concrete examples and engage in lively discussion as we build awareness, empathy, and understanding. We can all learn and do more to insure our LGBTQ+ family, friends, and community members are actively welcomed and included throughout our communities.

Our presenter, Katie Slivovsky, is a professional trainer, science writer, and exhibit developer. She was the former Exhibit Development Director and Co-Chair LGBTQ Inclusion at Chicago Children's Museum. She also cofounded the Chicagoland Alliance of Museums with Pride (CAMP). Katie developed the workshop, *10 Easy Ways to be more LGBTQ-Friendly and Why It Matters* in 2012 and has delivered it around Chicago and across the country. Katie has also published multiple articles about LGBTQ inclusion, age-appropriate nature education, and parenting for early childhood.

Though the topic of LGBTQ inclusion can feel heavy, Katie's approach includes a combination of humor, large group activities, and small group reflection. Her goal is for participants to leave the session feeling inspired and empowered to take a few steps toward ensuring all children and adults feel their support.

The format is still under development.

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Washington Update: Vote

The AAUW national election is April 7 to May 17. Each member with an email on file will receive a personalized email with online voting instructions. If you do not have an email on file, you can request a paper ballot until April 16.

On the ballot: the proposed change in membership requirements and other modifications to Bylaws and Public Policy Priorities.

They are directed toward ending systemic racism, achieving equity, and improved and focused data collecting to inform policy decisions and the apportionment of political representation.
