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October Branch Program 7:00 pm, Wednesday, October 6 via Zoom The Equal Rights Amendment (ERA)



Paula Johnson Purdue escaped her impoverished Illinois farm background when her mother made a bargain with her father after receiving an inheritance: if Paula could use part for college, he could use the rest for a tractor. After college and teaching in the southern Illinois suburbs for several years, Paula interviewed for a position with the Illinois Education Association (IEA). She was hired as a lobbyist—the woman of IEA did not think the three male lobbyists were as committed to the ERA as a woman might be—and immediately began to lobby for ERA.

Paula spent many years lobbying for ERA as well as teachers' rights in the Illinois State Legislature. She spent a great deal of time working with educational employees in the western suburbs until her retirement, and for a while after retiring from IEA was a lobbyist for the College of DuPage, working alongside the late former State Representative Vince Persico, who she helped get elected to several terms in the state legislature. But she never lost her passion for ERA.

Involved in several nonprofit organizations, Paula also serves as a Co-Director of Public Policy for AAUW-ILLINOIS. Since 1976 she has been committed to passing ERA. She will share her frustrations, triumphs, and hopes for the future with us.

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I love short stories because I think they are the way we live. They are what our friends tell us, in their pain and joy, their passion and rage, their yearning and their cry against injustice. Andre Debus

Indeed, AM Lit's October 1 book selection, *Stories from Suffragette City* edited by M. J. Rose and *Fiona Davis*, recounts the injustice that American women had to confront for decades. All thirteen stories take place on October 23, 1915, the day tens of thousands of women marched up Fifth Avenue, demanding the right to vote. The stories are about women of all ages, who come from different backgrounds, who are from different races, but who are all united in their resolve to pass the Nineteenth Amendment to the United States Constitution. When we gather at the Glen Ellyn Public library, first floor meeting rooms at 9:30 am on October 1, Patricia Spence and Susan Levy-Creed will lead the discussion of the individual stories. Bring your own coffee and snack or purchase them at the library's convenient café. The rooms allow for social distancing and can safely handle our group.

As of this month, AM Lit books are available at the Glen Ellyn Public library on the second floor. If you have a library card from a local DuPage County library, Glen Ellyn will allow you to check out books. They will confirm your card and set up an account for you. The Glen Ellyn Public Library is to be commended for all they do to support local book clubs!

AM Non-Fiction Sue Herrmann

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

Glennette taught elementary school for over 25 years and has been a member of our Branch since 1978. She is a prolific writer and has addressed her writing to this group. She has become nationally known for her research and writing on Black American history and the Underground Railroad. She researches little known events and brings them to life. *A Man Called Horse* reveals the life of John Horse, a Black Seminole Indian, who influenced the lives

of the Black Seminoles for over half a century.

Lavonne has been a member of our Branch since 2012. She has been instrumental in introducing Native American literature to our Branch. She is known for her work collecting and analyzing literature of Native American writers.
