Maureen Shekleton worked for many years as an ICU staff nurse, later a faculty member, clinical manager and educational administrator. She held faculty positions at the University of Illinois College of Nursing and at Lewis University. Maureen combined faculty and service positions at Rush University Medical Center. She holds a BS in Nursing from the College of Mount Saint Joseph, a MS in Nursing from Case Western Reserve University and a PhD in Nursing from Rush University. Prior to her retirement, she also served in a variety of positions in the American Nurses Association, Illinois Nurses Association and Illinois Nurse Foundation. She is a member of Sigma Theta Tau, the international nursing honor society. She is the co-author of two nursing textbooks and has published several book chapters, and clinical and research articles.

In addition, she has earned the rank of second degree black belt in karate. Maureen and her husband, Jerry, are volunteer puppy raisers for Canine Companions for Independence. She also serves as a board member for Ecumenical Support Services for the Elderly, works as an election judge, and volunteers at the Glen Ellyn Historical Society. She is also a member of the Christian Services Commission and Parish Council of St. Petronille Catholic Church. Maureen and Jerry have one son, a daughter-in-law and two beautiful granddaughters.

Mary Kelly first became aware of AAUW when her children attended Buttons and Bows, a day care center run by AAUW in Elmhurst. Mary, born in Pennsylvania, moved to Lombard at the age of ten. She earned a BS in Business Administration from Marquette University. She married Kevin and had four children. Later she earned a BS in Nursing from Northern Illinois University and an MBA in Health Administration from Saint Xavier University.

Mary started her career as a tax auditor for the Illinois Department of Revenue. Then armed with her nursing degree, Mary has held positions from bedside clinical nurse to large system stroke director in the Chicago Metro area. She has been a Disease Specific Care Reviewer (Stroke) for The Joint Commission since 2009 to the present. She is a Certified Neuroscience Registered Nurse (CNRN), a Fellow of the American Heart/American Stroke Association; and a member of the American Association of Neurological Nurses, the Neurocritical Care Society, and the American Association of Critical Nurses. Her publications include A *Comprehensive Review for Stroke Nursing*, 2014, as a co-contributing author.

At the October Branch meeting, membership voted to amend and approve the scholarship budget to \$6000. We will award scholarships of \$1500 each to our College of DuPage scholarship recipients in Spring, 2022.

The December 1 Winter Gathering event presenter via Zoom is Dr. Monica Reyes, a national AAUW Fellow recipient. Dr. Reyes is an Assistant Professor in the Writing, Rhetoric & Discourse Department, College of Liberal Arts & Sciences at DePaul University.

Monica will discuss her project, *Shelter Rhetorics: Understanding Narrative Pathways & Assemblages of the United States Asylum Process.* Her book follows her research at an emergency homeless shelter for displaced people on the United States-Mexico border. She explores how a person is eligible to apply for asylum in the U.S. if they are able to effectively persuade the United States— in writing— about the circumstances surrounding their escape from persecution in their home country. These narratives are vital as they open opportunities for work, education and a pathway to resettlement in the United States. However, composing these stories is challenging because of cultural, linguistic and economic barriers, which disproportionately affect women and families. *Shelter Rhetorics* analyzes how people who seek asylum and those who work with them at the shelter navigate the rhetorical pressures of having to write compelling asylum narratives.

Springfield Update: Family Medical Leave Insurance Act (SB835)

AAUW-IL is urging our support for SB835, which our state legislators will be considering in their next session, commencing January 2022.

The Family and Medical Leave Insurance Act creates a state-run insurance program that allows Illinois workers to use up to 26 weeks of job-protected leave a year:

- To welcome a new child into the home.
- To maintain a healthy pregnancy.
- For their own or a family member's illness.
- For reasons related to domestic or sexual violence.
- For reasons related to military service.
- Due to a public health emergency or disaster.
- Due to school or child care closures.

If you have an opportunity to talk to your state senator about this upcoming legislation, I can provide a helpful fact sheet provided by Women Employed. I will report back to the Branch about my contact with Senator Suzi Glowiak-Hilton (IL 24).
