### Dead Folks Do Tell Tales Speaker: Dr. Anne Grauer, Forensic and Biological Anthropologist



Loyola University Chicago Professor Anne Grauer received her doctorate in biological anthropology from the University of Massachusetts-Amherst. Dr. Grauer's research interests include paleopathology (the study of ancient human disease) and bioarchaeology (the study of human remains from archaeological contexts), with particular focus on the impact of sex, gender, and social identity on disease in the past. She is currently analyzing skeletons from medieval England and from cemetery populations in 19th-century urban centers in the United States. Dr. Grauer is a Research Associate of the Field Museum, and a forensic consultant for the FBI's Evidence Response Team, the Cook County Sheriff's Police, and the Cook County Medical Examiner's Office. In 2020 she was elected a lifetime Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science for distinguished contributions to the field of biological anthropology, particularly to the development of paleopathology as a

means of understanding social life in the past. Dr. Grauer has authored scores of books, scholarly articles, and other publications, holds leadership roles in numerous professional organizations, and is the Editor-in-Chief of the International Journal of Paleopathology.

Illinois completed its redistricting process per federal law (post every 10 years census) and created all new congressional districts. The title of the map accessed via the link below may say *draft*, but it is the final, Pritzker approved, map:

Note: the image is overlayed on Google Maps, so you can search any address, or just zoom in anywhere to find the exact boundaries of the districts.

*On a Personal Note*: Glen Ellyn Branch members now find ourselves in one of three districts: 3,6,8. Also, while my US House District, IL House District and DuPage County Board District have remained the same, in 2023 I will be in new IL State Senate District 21, not 24. In future Twigs, I will include links to additional redistricting changes that affect as many Branch members as possible. Please forward to me any other information you find useful.

#### Who is Knocking at Your Door?

#### Election Dates: 2022

The primary election date is June 28, 2022 (changed from March). The general election date is November 8, 2022. Candidates may run in any district in the state of Illinois, regardless of residency.
