February Zoom Meeting with AAUW-II and Branch Public Policy Chairs -Three Issues:

• Status of Legislation: Paula Purdue and Tracey Sherman-Falcon reflected on the success of last year's passage of the Health Care Reform Bill. AAUW-IL had supported the bill which centers around eliminating race-based and other inequities in the state's health care system and includes provisions to expand medical services available to low-income residents and residents of color.

Unfortunately, this year's vigorously supported Family Medical Leave Insurance Act (SB 835/HB 5029) will have to be reintroduced next legislative session. Paula and Tracey advised Branch Chairs to (1) find out what reservations their representatives and senators express about this bill; (2) ask for a meeting; (3) research pertinent points that counter the reservations; (4) present these points in the best format that can be arranged. Ask: What do you need to support this bill? Current research about FMLA shows paid leave will reduce the gender pay gap and modify the downward wage trajectory for women.

- Impact of Date Changes: Paula stated that the April 8 end date of the legislative session can be extended, but she doubted legislators would do so. Too many of them are in newly structured districts, so are eager to campaign. The June 28 Primary Election date moves primary outcomes closer to the November 8 Election. Candidates will not lose the campaign momentum they sacrificed with the former Spring Primary Election date.
- Reproductive Health Bills: A final comment from Paula: All passed legislation is under attack. In other words, passed but always in play.

Springfield Update:

- **HB 1722**, which diverts funds for public schools to private schools, has been recently opposed via witness slips by several Branch members. Currently, it has been referred to the Rules Committee. Note: a co-sponsor of **HB 1722** is Representative Amy Grant (IL-42), Wheaton. Jenni Purdue, AAUW-IL Lobbyist, encourages Branch members in IL-42 to have a conversation with Representative Grant. Jenni has found her to be approachable and this a good topic to discuss with her.
- Where's Waldo? Where is My District? Some days it seems easier for us to look for the fictional character in the distinctive blue cap than it is to know our state and congressional legislative districts. As Twigs goes to press, you can go to the following website to look up a sample ballot for your address, but candidates are not available, yet. https://www.dupageco.org/voterlookup
- **FOID Modernization Act:** In effect as of January 1, *HB 562* offers automatic gun license renewals for applicants who submit fingerprints; allows state agencies to share existing fingerprint databases; increases background check requirements for private gun transfers; allows for the development of future electronic gun license; establishes a stolen gun database and a new state police FOID revocation enforcement fund, among other things. Note: AAUW Public Policy views gun violence as a public health crisis as does the American Medical Association.
