Our first Branch meeting of the year will highlight the importance of affordable housing for gender equity. HOPE Fair Housing is a statewide organization working to achieve affordable housing in Illinois.

Nafia Khan is the Director of Outreach, Events & Fundraising for HOPE Fair Housing Center. Prior to joining HOPE, Nafia worked in the field of developmental disabilities for five years, in direct service and advocacy. She has worked in the nonprofit sector for the large part of her career, with experience in both state and local government, most notably with the Quinn administration.

There was one motion approved at that meeting: It is moved that the Branch change the name of its Educational Opportunity Fund to the Branch Gender Equity Fund. The motion was unanimously approved.



Branch Gender Equity Fund

Our Branch is renaming the Educational Opportunities Fund (EOF). Our AAUW Board agreed to update the name for this fund to *Branch Gender Equity Fund*. National AAUW has changed its focus from mainly education to include other gender equity issues. Since National AAUW no longer has a fund called Educational Opportunities Fund, we have chosen to modify our EOF name so it better aligns with the National fund options.

Judicial Candidates

In each State of Illinois legislative session, bills are routinely introduced to counter the reproductive rights bills that have successfully passed and are currently state law. Given this predictability, it is possible that challenges to current law could eventually reach the Illinois Supreme Court (if not beyond) as the final arbiter of legislation.

The current composition of the Illinois Supreme Court is four Democrats and three Republicans. The terms of four justices will expire in 2022. Two judicial terms will expire on December 4, 2022, and two judicial terms will expire on December 5, 2022. Two seats are up for partisan election on November 8, 2022. (The two other seats are up for retention election on November 8, 2022.) The judicial seat for District 3, which includes DuPage County, is one of these two partisan elections.

Support of reproductive rights is not exclusively the position of one party or a party candidate. It is, however, in the interests of our AAUW Public Policy Priorities that you find out as much as you can about the candidates for District 3, Justice Mary Kay O'Brien (D) and Michael J. Burke (R), currently an incumbent justice in District 2, as well as candidates for other judicial offices.

A commentator on *Chicago Tonight* said recently, *The fate of reproductive rights in Illinois could come down to the composition of our Illinois Supreme Court.* **You be the Judge.**
