Her talk, *Implicit Bias and how it affects Diversity, Equity and Inclusion*, used easily understandable illustrations to explain systemic racism. Implicit bias is created by repeated associations that become subconscious. We are not aware of this happening even though implicit bias can cause us to act opposite to our conscious beliefs. The takeaway I have from this talk is that while implicit bias is the most important cause of prejudice, most of our societal actions try to stop explicit prejudice. This will not cause the change we need. We need to treat the implicit bias that is the root cause of the problem. Implicit bias can be treated by understanding that we have it, that it is not our fault, but that with conscious effort, we can change it.

Our Branch remains a beacon of hope. Our scholarships made possible by *LUNAFEST*, our Used Book Sale, the Fall Fundraising Walk and many quiet donations from generous members sent another generation of young women to college, as well as supported the work done by our State and National AAUW. It is also a beacon for our members who gather to discuss books and films; listen to and view provocative, relevant programs; and assemble *Science Girls on the Go* kits under the direction of our *Chemist in Residence*, Fran Kravitz.

The Board met on November 9. After the minutes of that meeting are approved by the Board at the January 11, 2023 Board Meeting, they will be available on the Branch Website (*Members Only*) web page. Details of topics discussed are described in the reports from officers and chairs elsewhere in this newsletter.

There was one motion approved at that meeting:

Chair McGowan reported that the Branch has budgeted a \$3,000 contribution to national AAUW Funds. She asked for suggestions as to where to direct our contribution. After discussion of the available AAUW funds, Member Bacon moved that we direct \$1,000 to each of three Funds: Education and Training Fund (#4450), Economic Security Fund (#4449) and the National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) Scholarship Fund (#2504). Historian/Archivist seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

Next Board Meeting: 7:00 pm, January 11, 2023. Location to be determined.





At the November Branch Board meeting, we discussed allocation options for the \$3000 which our Branch will send in support of National AAUW. The results of our selection are as follows:

Education and Training Fund: \$1000

This fund addresses the barriers that prevent women from thriving in school and pursuing the careers of their dreams. That means championing equal access to education and ensuring women can learn in environments free from harassment and discrimination.

Economic Security Fund: \$1000

This fund promotes women's livelihoods through advocacy for fair-pay, legislation, researching the pay gap, training women to negotiate for the salaries they deserve, and advising employers on fostering fair cultures.

National Conference for College Women Student Leaders Scholarships: \$1000

The National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) Scholarship Fund provides access for a broader and more diverse audience to be a part of the leadership training, inspiration and networking opportunities provided during this event. For 2022 scholarships are \$195 per attendee so every contribution can make a difference and the more donations received, the more students are able to attend the conference.

Highlights of the Branch from the 1970s

- **1972:** We the People Study Group (In those days AAUW had study groups in which the first year was study; the second year an action project). The Branch compiled *Nuts and Bolts; A Citizens Guide to Local Government* for distribution to Branch members and area residents.
- **1973-74**: Developed a Speakers' Bureau for ERA with Glen Ellyn League of Women Voters and DuPage NOW. Volunteers made presentations at organizations throughout the community.
- 1973: Crisis in Education study led to Branch members volunteering as school board observers at elementary, high school, and College of DuPage; community coffees held with school board members; Branch position papers on school consolidation and appointed State Boards of Education. Branch initiates mentoring and tutoring programs.
- **1973:** *60 Seconds with a Sister,* a one minute profile designed to acquaint Branch members with notable women is presented at each Branch meeting.
- **1974-75**: Sex Role Stereotyping Study Group, a study of local elementary readers and an action project: textbook selection guides prepared for school districts.
- **1975-76:** *Bicentennial Project*: compiled achievements of women of DuPage County. Action: Provided curriculum units for all local elementary schools.
- **1977:** Branch Membership Directory lists members under their own names instead of that of their husbands (Mrs. Tom Balk became Sue Balk).
- 1979: Politics of Food Study Group compiles and distributes 1400 pamphlets on preschool nutrition and snack/treats in Wheaton and Glen Ellyn.
- 1979-80: At Ease with ERA program presented by Branch members to local community groups. The Branch participated in the Mother's Day March for ERA in Chicago on May 12, taking the Northwestern commuter train, dressing in white, and picking up other AAUW members at each train station. 90,000 women dressed in white marched down Michigan Avenue, and in Grant Park heard Betty Friedan, Gloria Steinem, Bella Abzug, Jean Stapleton, Chicago Mayor Jane Byrne, and Mary Grefe, President of AAUW who described herself as a mother, grandmother, and traditional Republican. Speaking for members from California to Massachusetts, from Minnesota to Louisiana she told the cheering crowd that we brought peanut butter sandwiches to Chicago because we are not going to spend any money in Illinois until Illinois ratifies ERA!

On May 10, the IL GOP voted down supporting ERA and sent Phyllis Schlafly as an alternate to the Republican National Convention.
