



A Leaf from the Co-Presidents

The Voice of the People was loud and clear thanks to the heads up from our vigilant Public Policy Chair, Patricia Spence who alerted us to Silvicom's proposal to build a 70,000 square foot garage for their hazmat carrying trucks. The proposed site, at the corner of Highland and Poss in unincorporated Glen Ellyn was ludicrously inappropriate considering its proximity to homes, schools, the Great Western Trail as well as being in a FEMA designated flood zone and wetland. An earlier proposal from Silvicom was rejected over a year ago. We and many others wrote and called our DuPage County Board members. Silvicom ultimately withdrew their proposal on January 2. As Margaret Mead said, Never underestimate the power of a small group of committed people to change the world. In fact, it is the only thing that ever has.

Our January Branch Meeting speaker, Mary Virginia Orna, PhD, showed us another area where a struggle continues. Only 3.76% of the Nobel Laureates in Chemistry were women. It is not as some might suggest that there were no worthy candidates. *Smithsonian Magazine* (January, 2023) noted that, *Women are far less likely to win major awards than their male peers regardless of the quantity and quality of their research.* Mary Sue has just ordered Dr. Orna's book, *March of the Pigments: Color History, Science and Impact*, and would be happy to share.

From 1983 to 1998, Sheila owned and led a consulting practice, supporting businesses in New England and throughout the country in human resource development, organizational development and management training. Her work involved the design and development of curriculum for developing team-based organizations.

In 1998, she retired to travel more extensively and pursue interests in the arts and in 19th and 20th century architecture and design. She was subsequently engaged as a consultant to Trinity Church in Boston for a \$53 million capital campaign. She was Director of National Programs for the Trinity Boston Preservation Trust and oversaw the Trust's government and private foundation development efforts. In May 2005 she began working with the North Bennet Street School in Boston and until 2015, held the position of Director, Foundation and Corporate Support. In 2015, she retired and moved first to Houston, Texas and then in September, 2021 to Wheaton to be closer to family.

She is an elected Fellow of the Massachusetts Historical Society, where she was a member of the Board of Trustees and chaired the Strategic Planning, Development and Membership Committee and served on the Fellows and Facilities Committees. She coordinated the Boston portion of a recent Wellesley College reunion and is a former patron of Wellesley's Davis Art Museum.
