Topic: Ladies in Waiting......and Still Waiting for a Nobel Prize Speaker: Dr. Mary Virginia Orna, Ph.D

That there is a gender imbalance in the list of Nobel laureates is uncontested. There are many reasons for this situation, among which one may cite the very small pool of women scientists. While that may have been true in the past, the number of women who are active in scientific research has grown exponentially, and yet we had to wait until 2020 (!) for two women to join the other five women chemistry laureates (3.76% in the Nobel's

120-year history). This talk will highlight an outstanding group of women, some of whom were nominated unsuccessfully for the prize many times, and some who were never nominated at all, but perhaps should have been. While we will discuss only the tip of the iceberg, there will be many more references suggested for further research and reading.

Mary Virginia Orna, Ph.D., is Professor Emerita of Chemistry, College of New Rochelle, New York. Her academic specialties are in the areas of color chemistry and archaeological chemistry. She is an American Chemical Society (ACS) Councilor for the Division of the History of Chemistry and has served on numerous ACS committees over the past thirty years. Her more recent books include *The Chemical History of Color* (Springer, 2013) and *March of the Pigments* (Royal Society of Chemistry, 2022). She contributed two chapters to the book that inspired the present talk, *The Posthumous Nobel Prize in Chemistry*, Volume 2, *Ladies in Waiting for the Nobel Prize*, edited by Vera Mainz and Tom Strom (2018). She has written a review on *The Code Breaker* for the ACS Senior Chemists Newsletter that will appear later in 2023. She has nineteen other authored, co-authored or edited books on chemical education and history of chemistry to her credit. She is also the recipient of numerous chemical education and service awards, including New York State Professor of the Year and National Gold Medalist. In 1994 she served as a Fulbright Fellow in Israel. Her hobby is constructing crossword puzzles; she has contributed many of these to the *New York Times* and to many ACS publications as well.

Congratulations to Donna Jean Simon, AAUW- IL President, and to our Co-President, Mary Sue Brown, for winning candidacies, respectively, as Village Trustee and Library Trustee of the Glen Ellyn Civic Betterment Party. They advance to the DuPage County Consolidated Election of April 4, 2023.

At the urging of our Branch members and others, Representative Terra Costa Howard (IL Dist. 48) signed on to be a co-sponsor of House Joint Resolution 94. The bill *affirms* the 28th Amendment, which prohibits the United States or any state from denying or abridging equal rights under the law on the account of sex. Representative Costa Howard predicts the bill will re-emerge for a vote in the Spring. Illinois was the 37th state to ratify the amendment; Virginia the 38th. Efforts like HJR-94, if matched by other states, keep attention on the unresolved status of the ERA in the office of the National Archivist.
