AAUW Oral History Project Carolyn Oesterle

You may have received yellow cards in the mail about the AAUW Oral History Project by the company PCI. This is sanctioned by AAUW National with the idea of checking members' information and also collecting oral histories about AAUW. I called the number to see what it was about. I spoke with Clarissa who first checked my information. She had my phone number wrong—I had recently checked it myself at the Community Hub and it is correct there. After she asked me questions about AAUW, she told me about merchandise they sell, including a bound volume of the histories for \$169.98. Or you could buy the entire package of hardbound book, digital publication, T-shirt, sweatshirt, and travel bag for \$489.96. I obviously declined.

I discussed the project with several AAUW-IL State Officers at the Spring convention. I was told by some that there was a one-third rate of PCI finding incorrect information for members. If my call was any example of this, the mistakes are theirs, not the AAUW database.

We discussed this project at the board meeting May 10 and want to be sure everyone knows that participation is entirely voluntary. If you call, you will be asked at the end to purchase overpriced products. Many of us are just discarding the yellow cards. I will be writing to the organizers of the project with my concerns.

Loneliness! There have been numerous articles in print and online recently about the impact of loneliness on our lives. Your health can be impacted by feelings of isolation and withdrawal, by losing social contacts, by living far from family.

However, not all our relationships are equally intense. The key is really the number of social interactions we have. *Casual relationships may be peripheral, but they're also one key to well-being*.(New York Times, April 25,2023). You walk into a group; you recognize most faces; you cannot quite remember the names. These are called *weak* ties, but they are essential to thriving and feeling connected. Our closest ties are family and dear friends, but that outer circle of friends, neighbors, co-workers is the one which provides opportunities for interaction and stimulation. Our AAUW Branch provides both kinds of interactions. We are healthier by belonging and sharing our ties with each other.

ERA Update from A.J. Conroy, ERA Illinois, via AAUW-IL Public Policy Group:

In late April, the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) was in the news due to a procedural vote in the Senate to close debate on a resolution for Congress to affirm ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment-- a request by President Biden. Even though the resolution had a majority, the Senate requires a 60-vote majority for most measures.

Next steps? For us in Illinois, that's pressuring Democratic Party legislators to make Biden's ERA promise a campaign issue. Please keep asking about the ERA at legislator events!

Branch Candidate AAUW Values Alignment Project Update:

In a final tally of the April Consolidated Election, in CUSD200, Erik Hjerpe received 6,723 votes; Amy Erkenswick received 6,690 in the contest for the fourth open school board seat. Since Hierpe was an aligned candidate, all aligned candidates won in CUSD200.

AAUW-IL 103rd Legislature Update:

As Twigs goes to publication, below are the bills that our state Public Policy leaders continue to support. Contact your legislators. These bills could emerge in a summer session or fall veto session.

- Sunset the Invest in Kids Act voucher program!
- Ask for an increase in FY24 Funding:
 - 1. \$2.88 million for the Illinois Department of Public Health's Family Planning Program to fill the funding gap and ensure that uninsured Illinoisans have affordable access to preventive reproductive health care like annual well visits, cancer screenings, birth control, and STI services.
 - 2. \$20 million in funding to the Department of Human Services for a *Keeping Youth Safe and Healthy* grant program to help local schools implement personal health and safety education in grades K-5 and sexual health education in grades 6-12.
- Advocate for passage:
 - 1. SB 1909 Deceptive Practices by Limited Services Pregnancy Center Deception: amends Consumer Protection Law to allow the Attorney General to investigate any limited-service pregnancy center found guilty of using fraud or deception to stop a person from receiving or entering a reproductive healthcare clinic.
 - 2. HB 2280 & SB 2427 *Health Care Cultural Competency*: would require cultural competency training to be a part of continuing health care education for medical professionals in Illinois.

98th Annual AAUW-IL State Convention Report May 5 and 6, 2023 Carolyn Oesterle

May 5

Sharmili Majmudar: Everyday Opportunities to Advance Pay Equity

It is disappointing that women still earn only 83% of what men earn. One improvement is in wage transparency in that employers cannot ask about past salaries. The pay gap starts with children's allowances—sadly.

May 6:

- President Donna Jean Simon: Reported on the state of AAUW-IL which is pretty good considering the pandemic, etc.
- Gloria Blackwell: Advancing Gender Equity: An Update
 Our CEO discussed that AAUW's effort in this area has had some legislative successes and progress in
 areas advancing equity for women, but much more needs to be done.
- Will It Play in Peoria? Excellent talks by two presenters from Peoria
 - Dr. Sheila Quirk-Baily discussed improvements that she has overseen in the Peoria Schools as the superintendent over the last 6 years. There has been significant increase in both test scores, graduation rates and college attendance after high school. This was implemented by reimagining education for struggling students and stressing diversity needs. She learned that having algebra early, even before high school was a marker for college admission and future success. She emphasized algebra for ALL students starting in eighth grade. She is an amazing leader.
 - **Dr. Sharon Desmoulin-Kherat** has been President of Illinois Central College since 2016 and discussed her successes with community outreach working through an equity lens to increase readiness for high school students and to provide support to students in poverty. She started a program where high school students can spend the last two years of high school taking college classes at a community college and receive an associate degree from the community college at the same time they receive their high school diploma.

Public Policy: Jenni Purdue

AAUW is lobbying for the Medical Leave bill in the last two weeks of this legislative session. They are lobbying for sunsetting the *Invest in Kids* bill that uses public funds for private education and advocating for the sex education curriculum that the state is sponsoring.

After lunch—Keynote Speaker

Dr. Elsa Vazquez-Melendez spoke on Inequities in Medicine

She gave an excellent talk on diversity issues and implicit bias in medicine. She gave an overview of implicit bias and then applied that to problems in medical care. I learned that since George Floyd's murder, the country has learned that implicit bias needs to be addressed. There is now implicit bias training in medical schools, hospitals and many corporations—just like the sexual harassment training of the 1990's. About time.

This was followed by affinity groups discussion. I was in the programs and public policy group. We discussed starting a program bank for the branches where Program Vice Presidents could search for excellent program speakers recommended by other branches. I agreed to help and have asked Jamie Nelson to help with the computer work and she agreed. Thanks Jamie.
