Presenter: Sam Mitrani, PhD From Hearth to Shield



Chicago's new mayor has recently selected the city's latest *top cop* as Superintendent of Police. Looking back, there was a time when this city had no such system as today, but rather a practice of private policing with neighborhoods simply kept orderly by their residents. Our October 4 speaker, Dr. Sam Mitrani, a history professor at the College of DuPage, is the author of *The Rise of the Chicago Police Department: Class and Conflict, 1850-1894.* An expert on the history of policing, Mitrani will explain how the economics of a

growing and changing city led to a business endeavor to protect capitalism in a city, by the late 1800s, described as one of the most violent in America.

As the medicalization of pregnancy and childbirth changed, over time, from the practice of female midwives to male doctors, private matters became public; and, this effect, particularly upon female residents, will be highlighted. In a manner both entertaining and informative, AAUW members will learn what is behind the title of Dr. Mitrani's presentation.

Believing that history, when studied, *constantly unfolds the past into the future*, Dr. Mitrani teaches a variety of courses at College of DuPage and adds new ones, such as *WWII and the Holocaust* and the *History of Work in the U.S.* Students give rave reviews of his classes. *Get ready to read* is one student's comment, referring to the class requirement of numerous novels, rather than textbooks. Dr. Mitrani is described as someone who *tackles the material with truth and grit* and as an instructor, who causes his students to *look deeper*.

Dr. Mitrani grew up in Vermont and New York before moving to the Midwest. He holds a Bachelor of Arts in Tutorial Studies and a Master of Arts in Social Sciences, both from the University of Chicago. Dr. Mitrani completed his PhD at the University of Illinois at Chicago. He has been teaching at the College of DuPage since 2011.

Arrive by 6:45 pm to meet and mingle and get ready for a 7:00 pm program to hear our past unfold as revealed by Dr. Mitrani. *From Hearth to Shield* promises to be an enlightening image.
