Speaker: Candace McCarthy King Who Are the New Neighbors?

Konrad Alexander said, When the world seems large and complex, we need to remember that great world ideals all begin in some neighborhood. Many of us have lived in DuPage County for years, often in the same neighborhood. Candace McCarthy King will help us update our knowledge of DuPage County. We know the county's population has burgeoned. Candace will examine how this growth has impacted the demographic makeup of the county and its effect on the economy, job growth and real estate. She will discuss how the population has aged and become more diverse. The cost of living and taxes have also increased to the point that some people are financially struggling to live here. How have women fared overall as the county has grown in the past decades? Is DuPage County on the right track, have our ideals been incorporated into the county plans and objectives?

Candace is very well qualified to discuss how DuPage County has evolved. She holds a Master of Public Administration from the University of Arizona, and a Bachelor of Arts from Barat College in sociology and political science. For over 23 years, Candace worked as an Executive Director of the DuPage Federation on Human Services and since her retirement she has been a part time Volunteer Committee member for the DuPage Foundation, a member of the DuPage Housing Authority Board, and a volunteer consultant for the Executive Service Corps.

Advocacy is important to AAUW. Two issues that AAUW strongly supports are the Equal Rights Amendment and the John R. Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act. The following information is from the AAUW website (aauw.org).

Affirm the Equal Rights Amendment

It has been a century since the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) was introduced, and despite some progress, women's equality is still at risk due to fluctuating legislative decisions. You can take action now by sending a message urging your Congress members to support ERA Now (H.J. Res. 82) for certifying the ERA as the 28th Amendment, ensuring women's rights are fully codified.

John R. Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act (H.R. 14)

With so much at stake each time we head to the ballot box, it is crucial that everyone can make their voice heard. The *John R. Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act (H.R. 14)* responds to the wave of voter suppression tactics enacted over the past decade with critical protections to ensure the freedom to vote for all.

The boxes Marcia is using are considerably smaller than a Banker's box; when filled, they are about the same weight as the shopping bags we used last year.
