# April Branch Meeting 6:45 pm, Wednesday, April 3 Glen Ellyn Police Department Plastic Pollution and Community Solutions Speaker: Jacquelyn Casazza

It happened so slowly we became used to plastic. Most of us remember a time when it wasn't so, when groceries were simply carried home in paper sacks or baskets from home were carried to neighborhood stores. But plastic is now common - and what to do with all of the containers, bags, etc. after a single use, has become a problem our next speaker will address at the Glen Ellyn Police Department. Jacquelyn Casazza will explain to the Wheaton-Glen

Ellyn AAUW Branch members and guests how we as a community can gain environmental awareness, learn which materials have single stream recycling benefits, and educate ourselves to be more thoughtful consumers.

President and co-founder of *Go Green Glen Ellyn*, Jacquelyn Casazza is on the Glen Ellyn Environmental Commission and is a member of the National Volunteer Speakers Bureau and the only Midwest speaker for Beyond Plastics.

She holds a BS from Vanderbilt University in Human and Organizational Development, was Senior Manager for Deloitte Tax LLP, and is an IRS Enrolled Agent. Jacquelyn Casazza also works with the Glen Ellyn Park District and last year, she and Karin Daly were named Volunteer of the Year, for events such as *Oaktoberfest* and the sport swap, sponsored by Go Green Glen Ellyn.

Plan to come early, mingle with members, enjoy refreshments, and then get ready to learn how we can more easily become greener. After the presentation there will be time for Q & A. It is a program not to be missed.

# Break Our Own Barrier: Open Up AAUW!

We are approaching a monumental decision. This April, we will have the opportunity to vote to open AAUW to those who do not hold degrees. We encourage you to vote *YES* on dropping the degree mandate. Voting *YES* is practicing the inclusion we as AAUW members believe. AAUW's National Board of Directors, Governance Committee, Advancement Committee, Inclusion and Equity Committee and our Illinois State Board of Directors all support this change.

Removing the degree requirement is not meant to take anything away from current member accomplishments or AAUW's commitment to education. Our endowment of well over a \$100 million will continue to grow and award fellowships and grants in increasing amounts each year (\$6.1 million last year). AAUW's membership requirements have changed many times over our long history to become more inclusive. This next step is a way to celebrate all that makes us extraordinary with a larger pool of driven individuals. Treating each other fairly, with respect and compassion, is the foundation of AAUW and serves as the catalyst of our current and future efforts.

What is our biggest challenge to breaking our own barrier? You may be surprised to learn that we believe it is voter turnout. While this is not the first time we have voted on this, we have never had more than 25% of our membership actually cast a vote. In 2021, a clear majority of those voting were in favor of the change (63%), but it takes a 2/3 vote to change a bylaw and we fell short of that bar.

Please vote and let us finally open up AAUW. There is so much work to do to accomplish our goals. Let us welcome all who share our values and believe in our mission to stand with us!

## The Inside Scoop Donna Jean Simon AAUW Illinois State President

The Wheaton-Glen Ellyn Branch is again a leader on our Illinois State Board. Another member of our Branch is being nominated for State President: Laura Desmarais. I hope that as many of you as possible will attend her installation at the State Convention on April 19 to 20. In addition, this year celebrates the 100th Anniversary of AAUW-IL. If you have not yet registered, an All Branch email recently provides you with all the information you need to do so. Each branch has been offered a display table at the convention to highlight and promote successes, best practices, and activities that they want to share with their sister branches. This also includes historical highlights over their branch's lifetime.

In 1924, when AAUW-IL was founded, women were required to have advanced degrees from a small list of accredited schools in specific accredited fields. Prospective members had to be recommended by current members and voted upon for membership. Often home visits were required prior to being allowed to join.

During World War II, a change in the bylaws permitted women from all accredited schools to be admitted. In 1963, membership was opened to women who had degrees in education, nursing, and home economics, which had not previously been approved areas of study. Interestingly, many of the branches that predate AAUW-IL were established in college towns or in cities with universities. Membership requirements for women in AAUW have evolved over the 140+ year history of AAUW.

Today, about 40% of women have college degrees. That means that we are eliminating a great many women who may in fact support our mission and would be excellent advocates for what AAUW stands for. Accounting firms and law offices and businesses who once required college degrees are now preferring certificates in specialty areas and bringing in many successful women who advance into leadership positions without college degrees per se.

If we stand for gender equity, why are we discriminating against non-degreed women? I recently heard the story of a women who began college when she was in her twenties, but had to drop out because of family responsibilities and financial difficulties when becoming a single mom. She returned to school in her 50's when her children were grown, and she was able to devote time to herself. As a straight A student, she was able to complete her education and get a well-paying job in the area in which she had originally wanted to work.

Our own Branch considered having a scholarship for a woman returning to school not so long ago. These are important considerations if we want to support education, and economic security and leadership for all women.

AAUW stands for values that are intersectional, inclusive, intergenerational, and empowering. While we are nonpartisan, we are not values neutral. This means we fight to remove barriers and biases that stand in the way of gender equity. We train women to negotiate for pay and benefits and to pursue leadership roles. And we advocate for federal, state, and local laws and policies to ensure equity and end discrimination. We support *Get Out the Vote* efforts. There is much work remaining to be done and we need every woman who wants to support our mission and our efforts to be admitted to membership.
