A Resilient State: What Illinois is Doing Right and Why It's Better Than You Think



Ready to start out 2025 on a positive note? Join us from the comfort of your warm home to hear from two experts, Dr. Robert Bruno and Frank Manzo, who will share good news about the state of Illinois. They have done much in-depth research (some just reported in the December 9 Chicago Tribune) and will relate that Illinois' population is stable, its workforce has grown, and it is a good place to earn a living as its economy has become more robust! They will dispel media reports and myths claiming otherwise. We are fortunate that the University of Illinois' Robert Bruno and Illinois Economic Policy Institute's Frank Manzo will lead the discussion of what Illinois has done right, what the state could be doing better, and where it may go in 2025 and beyond.

Dr. Robert Bruno is Director of the Labor Education Program and a Professor of Labor and Employment, as well as the director of the Project for Middle Class Renewal in the School of Labor and Employment Relations at the University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign. He has published numerous scholarly articles on a range of labor relations subjects, and he is also the author of five books on labor relations. He has given expert testimony to the U.S. House Committee on Education and the Workforce. Dr. Bruno is co-editor of Labor Studies Journal and is executive board member of the United Association for Labor Education. He earned a PhD from New York University, a MA from Bowling Green University and a BA from the University of Illinois. He is also currently serving as the president of Glen Ellyn's School Board, District #41.

Frank Manzo is an Economist at the Illinois Economic Policy Institute (ILEPI), a nonprofit research organization he cofounded in 2013 to promote economic growth for businesses and working families. In the last 11 years, Manzo has authored and co-authored more than 200 research reports, been published in four peer-reviewed academic journals and been cited by numerous government agencies-including the Biden White House. He authors a monthly column in the Daily Herald. He earned a Master of Public Policy from the University of Chicago and a BA in Economics from the University of Illinois, Urbana- Champaign.

Since there are many possible changes nationwide in the US public policies during the next Presidential term, I urge all members to regularly check the AAUW (aauw.org) and AAUW-Illinois (aauw-il.aauw.net) websites to stay informed and to act when needed.

The Illinois General Assembly has tentatively set dates for a veto session January 2-7. No information is available as of the writing of this article as to what, if any, actions will be taken. The new session of the 104th General Assembly will begin on January 8, 2025.

If you need to identify your elected officials there is a link on the AAUW Illinois website that connects to the Illinois State Board of Elections interactive page. If you enter your voting address, you will get a list of your national and state elected officials.
