Delia Ramirez, the representative in the House of Representatives for Congressional District 3, celebrated our longtime member, **Glennette Turner**, during Black History Month. Rep. Ramirez honored Glennette as a lifelong teacher and local historian in DuPage County, and who bravely participated in multiracial coalitions struggling against injustice.

For decades, Glennette preserved stories of Black Resistance. Having moved to DuPage County in 1968, she published her first book, "The Underground Railroad in DuPage County Illinois", in 1978.

Rep. Ramirez commended Ms. Turner for her service as an educator, a powerful historian and a cultural steward for her contributions that have now been entered into the Congressional Record. "Congratulations, Glennette, for your many, many contributions throughout your life."

# Title IX in Transition: Understanding the New Landscape

Mindful of the recent changes in national leadership, the issues of gender equity and sexual misconduct in educational institutions is an issue for discussion and reexamination. This talk will provide an overview of the latest updates to Title IX regulations and focus on implications for schools, students, and educators. Exploring how these updates impact the broader landscape of and disagreement over gender equality in education will be explained during the presentation.

Clarence Goodman has agreed to reschedule An Unfinished Journey: African Music in its Pivotal Decades and will be presented at the Wheaton Public Library on a special date of Thursday, May 15. We will gather by 6:45 pm and Mr. Goodman will perform at 7:00 pm with an opportunity for questions. Using a slide show of major events affecting the music, displayed in the background, Clarence Goodman accompanies classic songs on his guitar, sings, and plays harmonica.

He takes us on a musical journey from pre-Emancipation Proclamation days through the Great Migration and Jim Crow to the 1960s era Civil Rights and Vietnam protests most of us remember. It isn't an easy journey, but it is part of our history and Mr. Goodman uses his talent to guide us musically and help us understand the stories behind songs that have become familiar and artists whose works we already know well.

Our PM Non-Fiction group just discussed Cat Bohannon's "Eve" which traces the evolutionary development of the human female. Bohannon devotes Chapter 8 to the topic of menopause. The human female is the only known land animal to develop menopause. (We share this feature with several whale's species.) Put simply, our life spans extend beyond our reproductive years and longevity is increasing the number of years women are in menopause.

In an article in the New York Times (January 28, 2025), Dr Lisa Mosconi points out that "Menopause remains one of the most under-diagnosed, under-researched, under-treated, and underfunded fields in medicine. We owe women centuries of research." Until 1993 there were no laws requiring that women be included in clinical trials. The fluctuation of female hormones made women a complicated research subject—males were preferred.

If you need information or help with the symptoms of menopause, please check the AIR "Health and Resources" website list. There is a service listed under "Gynecology" that deals specifically with menopause issues: MyMenopauseRX which has recently opened an office in Wheaton under the Northwestern Medicine umbrella.

Started by Board approval in 2000 by Anne Prichard, Cindy Trennert-Lukens, and Marilyn Mayer Wiedemann uniting members of our AAUW Branch and Citizens for Glen Ellyn Preservation.

The goal was not only to enjoy the cultural art of film and discussion, but to support **The GlenArt Theatre**, an at-risk architectural and cultural landmark of the Village of Glen Ellyn. From the beginning it included guys, because many of the CGEP members were guys, and, oh heck, guys are fun at some discussions, right?

Early on, **The GlenArt** always had one theatre devoted to foreign film and, of course, we always chose that. The seats were much worse than they are now!



#### **MEMOIR CIRCLE** (2001-2007)

Started by Board approval at the request of Janet Quish, a Branch member who had a side gig helping elderly patients and assisted living residents construct memoirs for their families.

No one was an official "writer." About 10 joined the group. We enjoyed ourselves immensely with small work, often only paragraphs, never more than a page, revealing a moment in our past. Maybe just sitting on a stair at grandma's or bringing home the classroom rabbit to our surprised mother for care.

An old photo looked at again more closely: what were we thinking back then? What are we thinking of now? Just a paragraph to read aloud to the group, ultimately helping us feel that our lives had mattered even in the small spaces and that writing let that out.

Laura Desmarais, leader at our most recent AM LIT discussion of "The Heaven and Earth Grocery Store" wisely noted that the author (James McBride) "had resolved some of his own angst by writing about characters, starting with his mother." That's what memoirs do.

That's why **Memoir Circle** was such a great Branch activity. We introduced ourselves to others—and even to ourselves—in delightfully small ways.




