AAUW has announced the 2025 Strategic Plan – a bold vision for advancing equity for women and girls which includes three powerful priorities:

- Champion gender equity through education and funding, directly empowering women – especially in underrepresented communities and STEM fields – through higher education, research and advocacy.
- Remove barriers to success in higher education by taking action to ensure every woman can thrive in higher education without bias or barriers. Areas of concern include defending Title IX, expanding financial aid opportunities and providing campus support.
- Strengthening AAUW from the ground up, investing in local, state and national efforts.

More information about the Strategic Plan is available at the Association website, aauw.org. All these priorities are under attack in our country. During the summer, I urge you to regularly check aauw.org and AAUW social media as well as the websites and social media of like-minded progressive organizations for updates and calls-for-action.

On a somewhat lighter note, a new movie, *“Lilly”*, is out in very limited release. I was able to see a pre-release screening of the movie on the AARP streaming app. As of May 2025, the only Chicago area theater showing the movie is the Landmark on Clark St. in Chicago. Hopefully, it will be shown at more theaters in the next few weeks or become available via streaming services. The movie is the story of Lilly Ledbetter.

Having grown up in poverty, Lilly Ledbetter endured a work environment plagued by pervasive harassment for the sake of the best paycheck in the county where she lived. When she was close to retirement, Lilly discovered that the system has been cheating her, paying her close to half of what the men with the same jobs were earning. Outraged, Lilly fought this injustice in lawsuits that went all the way to the Supreme Court, the corridors of Congress and eventually the White House, all while powerful forces tried to shut her down. The movie stars Patricia Clarkson as Lilly.

The AAUW Legal Advocacy Fund provided some of the funding for Ms. Ledbetter’s lawsuits. I was fortunate to meet her several years ago at an AAUW Convention. Due to the statute of limitation for filing a lawsuit challenging fair pay, she never received any back pay or damages. The **Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act of 2009** was the first law signed by President Barack Obama. Lilly Ledbetter died in October 2024 at the age of 86.

But the Fair Pay Act has not corrected all the inequities in pay for women. According to the AAUW website, pay inequity continues to be a major detriment to women. Women who work full time take home about 83 cents for every dollar a full-time male worker is paid. In 1973 women earned 79 cents for every dollar man earned.

Unless things change, the pay gap will not close until 2106 (that’s not a typo – it will take 81 more years), which is why AAUW is working to empower women nation-wide with salary negotiation skills and working to change policies and employer culture.



May was a busy month for the AAUW Online team. Our Facebook posts highlighting the Book Sale and other Branch activities reached over 6,800 users just in the first two weeks! This publicity resulted in several big donations and increased drop offs at our drop off locations. Now we turn to promoting the June drop off details and the Book Sale details. How can you help?

- The Branch's two Facebook pages (i.e., the Branch page and the Used Book Sale page) will continue to be very active in June. We plan to frequently remind all that they can still drop off books at Park View School while we are setting up for the sale. We will also post eye-catching pictures with details of the Book Sale's location and offerings. Keep the buzz going with a reply, such as, "I'll be there" or "Can't wait" or "Time to buy my beach books".
- If you are a member of a Facebook Group, such as, What's Happening in Glen Ellyn" (or "...Wheaton", or "...Lombard", share our posts to increase our reach. Add a comment, such as, "I look forward to this event each year." Posts mean more if they are personally recommended, not just an ad.
- Flyers are available on the Branch website. Download a flyer and attach to an email that goes out to your book-loving friends, neighbors and local relatives. Ask them to share with others who may be interested.
- Are you a member of non-AAUW book group? Be sure to let them know about the Book Sale details and this year's new items, the puzzles and board games.

Let's try to increase our likes and shares this year. We have a lot of books to sell! Our goal is to get more people into the building. Once inside, the books will sell themselves. Have you ever seen a Book Sale customer buy only one book?

I have walked in carrying my laptop and was able to talk through my problems and got them fixed. (How is it that it's no longer possible to get a nice, printed instruction manual?)

My personal "Seattle expert" suggested that I go to **Best Buy** and consult their **GEEK SQUAD**. This unit of Best Buy is available at their stores in Bloomingdale (630-582-1070), or Downers Grove, (630-620-9040). Geek Squads have a fine reputation among geeks—such as my Seattle son. STEM Volunteers Needed

The STEM committee is looking for members who are interested in carrying out STEM activities for the AAUW Wheaton Glen Ellyn Branch. No science experience needed just a willingness to have fun making science accessible for young girls and other children in the community. Members who have participated will tell you that it is fun and rewarding when you see the face of a child light up with excitement as they understand the topic and succeed in the experiment

Our Branch has two main STEM projects. The first began in 2020 during Covid with the development of "Little Science Houses". Science Girls on the Go™ was a novel approach to continuing to encourage and inspire STEM projects with girls while maintaining social distancing and lowering the risk of spreading the Covid virus. Free science enrichment kits for K-12 girls are placed into little science houses (like little free libraries). Currently the Branch has three science houses, two in Wheaton (1445 Brentwood Lane and 1516 Paula Avenue) and one in Glen Ellyn (373 Oak Street). Each science house contains about 20 kits and is refilled as needed. Once a month, a new science kit is added. Each kit comes with instructions and an introduction to the science behind the activity, along with further experiments using the science principles of the kit.

Our second program is a STEM workshop once a month with the Glen Ellyn Public Library. We present a different experiment each month, along with explaining the scientific concept behind the experiment. All workshops are on Mondays from 3:30 p.m. to 5 p.m. Our upcoming dates and topics are:

Monday, September 8, 2025 Floating Maglev Train

Description: In this workshop, students will make a train without wheels using only magnets. Students will learn about magnetic fields, forces and poles and how to overcome gravity.

Monday, October 13, 2025 Make a Battery Instead of Lemonade

Description: In this workshop, students will learn how to convert chemical energy from lemons into electrical energy. Do other fruits and vegetables work to create chemical batteries? We will learn why this works.

Monday, November 10, 2025 Tensegrity Structures

Description: Students will build a structure which defies gravity. In this workshop, students will learn about tensegrity or tension integrity, a principle of physics coined by Buckminster Fuller.

Glenbard South



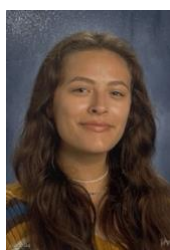

Wheaton-Warrenville South



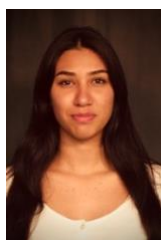

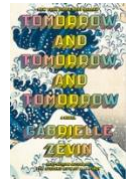

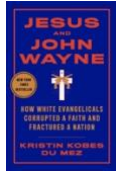
